Controller Dawes has received upward of \$22,000 from school children for the Lafayette monument in Paris. There are still thirteen states to be heard from and it is believed the fund will amount to \$50,000.

Maria Teresa Relies.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 21.—Captain McCalla, in charge of the repair ship Vulcan, now at Cat Island, has cabled Commandant Farquhar that Lieutenant Hobson, with the Vulcan and Potomac, would arrive here about December 1.

As the navy department permitted Captain McCalla to use his own judgment at the Infanta Maria Teresa wreck, it is to be presumed the cruiser is to be stripped of everything that would likely prove a relic, including the 11 inch gun which was mounted aft.

A large number of the Terrest's guns are already here, and also the Colon's safe, which will be opened at this navy yard. The flagship New York has distributed copies, printed abroad, of the original log of the Colon, which tells of her movements from the time she left Cadiz to the hour of sailing out of Santiago harbor.

Detectives For a Bishop.

Des Moines, Ia., Nov. 21.—A new feature of the bitter fight over the election of a bishop for the Episcopal diocese of Iowa has just developed at Cedar Rapids, the home of Dr. Thomas Green, acting bishop and leading candidate for the office. It is charged that the opposition to Green's candidacy have sent detectives to Cedar Rapids to spy upon the actions of Dr. Green and to find, if possible, evidence against the acting bishop which will substantiate the serious charges made against his moral character.

Is a Polygamist.

Salt Lake, Utah, Nov. 22.—The threats made of excluding B. H. Roberts, representative-elect from this state, from congress on the ground that he is an active polygamist, and therefore ineligible, have caused some stir among the politicians of this state.

Mr. Roberts is an active polygamist. He admits that he has more than one wife. But he has violated no Federal law since the admission of Utah and has never been proceeded against under the state law.

With the admission of Utah to statehood the Federal statutes relating to polygamy became inoperative. The legislature enacted a law against unlawful cohabitation, and the state constitution contains an anti polygamy clause, but these have never been enforced.

Polygamy was not an important issue in the recent campaign, although a few republican papers attacked Mr. Roberts on the ground that he was a polygamist.

It is a noteworthy fact that Roberts was scratched more heavily by Mormons than by Gentiles, showing existence of a strong anti-polygamist sentiment among the Mormons. In the strong Gentile communities Roberts polled the full vote of his party.

The settlement of that question after years of strife and heartache left upon men moral obligations from which no decrees of the church could release them and no act of the state could absolve them.

The demand of the American people as expressed through their representatives in the American congress through the enabling act went no further than this: That perfect tolerance of religious sentiment shall be secured, provided that polygamous or plural marriages are forever prohibited.

Utah's present representative, Mr. King, would doubtless resist any attempt to deprive Roberts of his seat, as would also the two senators.

What They Want.

Chicago, Nov. 21.—The national assembly of the Knights of Labor at their annual meeting in this city, have decided to recommend to the industrial commission the repeal of government by injunction the prohibition of employment of children of 16 years of age, the prohibition of watering stock by any railroad corporation, the establishment of postal savings banks, government control of railroads, the issuance of green backs by the government direct, the election of United States senators by the people's vote, the election of the president by popular vote and the initiative and referendum.

The Storm at Orange.

The wind struck Orange yesterday with more force than in this city, and the result was considerable more damage. Many windmills were blown in and a few small outhouses demolished.

At the D. R. Wingate lumber company planing mill the shed on the north side was lifted up and mashed to splinters. Robert Looney and two other men who were at work there had barely time to leap under a heavily loaded flat car before portions of the wrecked shed rattled down past where they had stood a second before.

The cupola at the Orange Lumber company planing mill was unroofed, as was a portion of the shed on the north and a shed that stood at the end. Two sections of the roof are gone from the shed leading from the dry kiln to the planer, and some of the roof of the long dry lumber sheds west of the mill.

The damage to the D. R. Wingate planing mill will touch \$600; that at the Orange Lumber company planer will exceed \$350, while that at the electric light plant will be fully \$300.

Back to France.

New York, Nov. 21.—The World's Paris cable says: An order to bring Dreyfus home to France is certain to be issued in a few days.

The court of cassation directed that his examination begin by cable, well knowing that such a method was impracticable and that his return would become imperative. That fact is now recognized, and Judge Loew, with the assent of all his colleagues on the bench, has drawn up a peremptory demand on the colonial minister, it is said, for the production of the prisoner in person.

The court is anxious to avoid any action likely to embarrass the government, and so this demand will be made at the most favorable possible moment, probably when Colonel Picquart's innocence is proved, and the popular prejudice against Dreyfus is checked.

Showers of threatening letters have been received by the members of the court of cassation, and especially the president, Mr. Loew, a judge of the very highest integrity. The judges are all under special police protection.

For the same reason Mme. Dreyfus lives in strict seclusion, close to Paris, and Mathieu Dreyfus, acting on the advice of the prefect of police, never ventures out unaccompanied after dusk.

Precautions taken by the police show clearly that they know there is a conspiracy to murder those prominently identified with the Dreyfus agitation, but are so afraid of the military party they dare not arrest the conspirators.

Each succeeding step toward the vindication of Dreyfus provokes the anti-Dreyfus press to fresh unscrupulous calumny.

The Soir publishes a statement by a former woman servant of Maitre Labori (Zola's counsel) that she heard him say once: "I am convinced that Dreyfus is guilty, but money can do anything, and the Hebrews have it."

Labori's contemptuous refusal to notice this fabrication the Soir impudently interprets into an admission of its truth.
