CALLS IT INHUMAN.

London, Nov. 2.—A Ladysmith dispatch of Tuesday says that Joubert has sent formal written protest to General White against the use of Lyddite as inhuman. The British long range guns are vastly superior to the Boers'. The captured column exceeds eight hundred. We are sanguine and confident of holding our own. The British long range guns have proved so superior that they should alter fighting hereafter. A great artillery engagement must occur immediately; our guns dominate Boers and are much more smartly handled. After the battle yesterday a brief armistice was declared to bury the dead and collect the wounded. The British losses are over eight hundred.

COULDN'T PAY RENT.

LADYSMITH LINE IN TACT.

London, Nov. 3.—A dispatch received today from Durban says that the telegraph line from there to Colenso is opened and that the railway to Ladysmith remains intact.

APPALLING LOSSES.
London, Nov. 3.—A Ladysmith dispatch, dated Tuesday at 5:30 p.m., says that our artillery firing was appalling. The Boers lost hundreds of killed and wounded. Where the Lyddite shells from the naval guns rained upon them they fell in heaps.

BOER ACTIVITY INCREASING.

A STRICT CENSORSHIP.

London, Nov. 3.—The war office censorship extends to all South African cables, except those to foreign governments due to the fact that Boer agents have been sending and receiving through foreign governments officials uncontrolled code messages on British.

VICE PRESIDENT'S CONDITION.

Patterson N. J., November 3.—Vice President Hobart had an attack of weakness at 2 o'clock this morning, but rallied after an administration of medicine. He is stronger and in fairly good condition.

CHASING THE FILIPINOS.

Manila, Nov. 3.—Majora Bishops and Cobells, battalions yesterday cleared the country from Cusuga to Florida, Blanco and the adjoining hills of insurgents. They report the insurgent cavalry exterminated. The Macabees this morning whipped some insurgents ambushed between Santiago and Senrages. Seven Filipinos killed. A Macabee lieutenant was killed and a private wounded. Transportation difficulties continue to impede operations and the troops supplies are arriving slowly. To-day the men were put on half rations of bread, meat, of native beef, and rice.

A SLIGHT TIP.

New York, Nov. 2.—The New York Journal says: "Billy Delany to-day stated to the Evening Journal that Jeffries has trained in opposition to my wishes. I have objected to his continual running. He would not work as hard as he has if I had had more to say about it. I don't mean to say he is not physically fit or unable to beat Sharkey, but there is a limit to everything and I have objected all along to his severe methods of training." Wm. Brady, Jeffries manager, says that Jeffries will beat Sharkey to-night. Both are reported in good condition. Jeffries is the favorite, but even money may prevail at the ring side.

AUSTIN BUDGET.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 3.—Attorney General Smith received a letter today from the district attorney at Belton, Texas, enquiring as to whether or not guarantee insurance companies are privileged to make bonds in criminal cases. The question is occasioned by the making of a criminal bond at Belton, by a guarantee company. Attorney General Smith replied that the law permitting them to do business in the state, in his opinion did not contemplate that they should make bonds in criminal cases, and hence he advised the rejection of the bonds in question.

ARCHITECT SELECTED.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 2.—The secretary of the treasury has approved the finding of the commission appointed to select a design for the New York custom house and selected Cars Gilbert, of New York, as architect.

THE PHILIPPINE POLICY.
Washington, D. C. Nov. 3.—The Philippine commission has agreed that the United States should retain permanent control of the Philippines and its recommendations will be the basis of the president's expansion policy, upon which the executive will ask congress to provide for a permanent army of 100,000 men, a measure which failed during the last session because of the democratic opposition in the senate. The present military establishment is merely a provisional arrangement to meet the exigencies of colonial obligations until congress can be induced to provide for an army in accordance with the plans of the war department.

H. Hirsch has made arrangements to have the Jeffries and Sharkey fight reported to-night by rounds at the Cordova Bar. Arrangements have been made for a special wire to report the fight. Everybody invited, as it is all free.

TO SABINE PASS.

Mr. Wm. Elliot, who was selected by Capt. F. C. Hand to organize a surveying party to run a preliminary line for the Corsicana and Southeastern Railroad from Buffalo in Leon county to Sabine Pass, has selected his men, and the party will start for Buffalo where work will begin Saturday. The men will start overlaid in a wagon, with their outfit at noon Saturday and Capt. Hand and Mr. Elliot will follow starting from here in the evening. The survey will be under the immediate supervision of Capt. Hand, who will stay with the boys to the end.

ADVANCE IN LUMBER RATES.
General Freight Agent Davis of the cotton Belt has sent out a notice to lumbermen announcing that it has been decided, effective December 1, to advance the rates on yellow pine lumber from mills in Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas and Indian territory to points in Kansas and Nebraska. The rates have not yet been checked in, but it is the idea to advance them to points in Kansas now taking 27 1/2c to 30c and to points now taking 26c to 28c.

is proposed to grade up to 24c. There will also be some changes to points in Kansas and Nebraska now taking 22c rate. The rate to Lincoln will be 24c. There will also be some changes in the rates on hardwood lumber. Tariffs are now being revised and will be passed as early as practicable.
