SEEMS HE COULDN'T STAY. Special to the Daily Enterprise. London, Jan. 4.—Official telegrams to-day from General Pitcher state that owing to military reasons his marching expedition could not permanently occupy Douglas and has evacuated the town, leaving it over to the enemy bringing to Belmont all the loyalists, as they stated to General Pitcher that their lives would be worth nothing five minutes after the army left. The transportation facilities proved inadequate to move all the people and the transport wagons of the command was given over to the use of women and children.

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 4.—The steamer Albermarle belonging to the Old Dominion Steamship company, is ashore in James river near this place, assistance was asked by the officers which is being rendered. All the passengers have been safely landed, and men are at work trying to keep the heavy ice floated away from the vessel, wrecking tugs have left for the scene of accident.

RAILROAD NOTES.

Mr. John H. Kirby, of the Kay See, returned to-day from Austin, where he has been in attendance on the Railroad Commission, which went into session yesterday, the main object of which was to reduce the freight rates on lumber. Mr. Kirby is thoroughly acquainted with the lumber situation throughout the country, and in behalf of the lumbermen of Beaumont, he protested vigorously against the abandonment of blanket rates, and said that the uncalculated proposition to disturb the present adjustment, which is very satisfactory to both lumbermen and railroads, had effected the lumber business materially by injecting an element of uncertainty which had already resulted in a curtailment of orders, which would be held back as long as the matter was pending, and that the roads could not stand a rent in the present rates.

Mr. A. T. Wansborough, the recently appointed traffic manager for the Warren and Corsicana Pacific Railroad Co., is in the city today enroute to Warren where he is in company with General Manager I. 
