SEYMOUR CAPTURED

ENGLISH ADMIRAL AND CAPTAIN CAPTURED.

Horrible Sights in Tien Tsin—The United States will Rush Troops to China.

SEYMOUR CAPTURED. Special to The Daily Enterprise. The Foo, June 26.—Admiral Seymour has been captured. The Chinese overwhelmed the relief column. Foreign ministers have left Pekin under guard of Chinese soldiers. Nobody seems to know where they have gone. These reports are from Japanese sources and are believed to be true.

JAP REPORTS. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Shanghai, June 26.—Japan reports say that Admiral Seymour is a prisoner. They say also that Captain McCalla of the cruiser Newark is a prisoner.

SIMPLY HORRIBLE. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Taku, June 26.—An agent here of a foreign firm at Tien Tsin has received reports of the horrible condition of affairs there. Massacred men and women from every European nation, as well as American and Japanese, litter the streets. The banks were looted and destroyed.

PRIESTS MURDERED. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Shanghai, June 26.—The Catholic priests, Fathers Isore and Andianer, were murdered near Tien Tsin by the Boxers. Most of the missionaries from Tien Tsin were brought to Che Foo. Several missionaries reached Pekin from Tien Tsin, reaching there before the railway line was broken.

MARINES IN CHICAGO EN ROUTE TO CHINA.

Special to The Daily Enterprise. Chicago, Ill., June 26.—The Fourth battalion of the United States marines passed through last night in a rush assignment to duty in the Orient. They will sail from San Francisco on July 1 for Cavite. Captain Biddle said he expected orders at Japan to throw his command in the fighting line in China. There were 235 in the battalion, and recently were located in Norfolk, New York and Washington.

NINTH INFANTRY READY FOR CHINA.

Special to The Daily Enterprise. Washington, June 26.—General MacArthur cables that the Ninth infantry will sail on the 27th thoroughly equipped and supplied with everything.

GEN. CHAFEE ORDERED TO CHINA. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Washington, June 26.—General Chafee was at the war department today and received his instructions. He will

sail from San Francisco on July 1 with the Sixth cavalry and will take command in China.

BROOKLYN GOES TO CHINA. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Washington, June 26.—The navy department has announced that the Brooklyn, with Admiral Remy, will take 300 marines from Manila to Taku. The gun boat Princeton has been ordered to Foo Chow, and thence to Shanghai.

MR. LOWTEER GOES. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Washington, June 26.—Mr. Lowteer, secretary of the British embassy here, will go to China as charge d'affaires in place of Ambassador McDonald, who has been recalled on account of bad health.

HARD PRESSED. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Berlin, June 26.—Admiral Seymour, with the ambassadors and ministers from Pekin, is twelve miles from Tien Tsin and is hard pressed, according to a government dispatch.

ARMY MARCHING. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Che Foo, June 26.—The allied army is marching on Pekin and will save Seymour and the ministers there or avenge them.

TAKU FORCE REACHES TIEN Tsin. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Washington, June 26.—Admiral Kempff cables yesterday that the Taku relief force reached Tien Tsin on the 23d. The Pekin relief force is reported within ten miles of Tien Tsin and surrounded. A force to assist them left Tien Tsin on the 24th.

KEMPPFF'S REPORT CONFIRMED. Special to The Daily Enterprise. London, June 26.—Rear Admiral Kempff's announcement of the relief of Tien Tsin was confirmed today from Hong Kong. The Shanghai bank at the same time received advices from Singapore that Tien Tsin had been relieved.

ACTIVE BOERS. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Kroonstadt, June 26.—Commandant Dewet is exceedingly active. He attacked the railway between here and Honing Spruit yesterday and cut off the Canadian outpost. The British loss was two killed and five wounded. Three are missing.

TEDDY TO SPEAK AT QUINCY. Special to The Daily Enterprise. Quincy, Ill., June 26.—Governor Roosevelt has wired the Rough Riders campaign club that he will speak here on July 5 on his return to New York.

GEORGIA PHILANTHROPIST. Special to The Daily Enterprise. New York, June 26.—Banker Witham of Georgia, the philanthropist who is giving his employees a big holiday, arrived here this morning from Astor Park. Among the party are four honeymoon couples. All are at the Gibsey House.

THE SOUTHERN'S WRECK.
Atlanta, Ga., June 25.—Thirty-seven bodies have been recovered from the wreckage of the Southern train which went into a washout one mile and a half from McDonough Saturday night. Three bodies were found today. They were:
D. Y. Griffith, supervisor.
W. L. Morrisette, superintendent of the charred pieces of two other bodies were also found.
The injured who were sent to McDonough, Macon and brought here, have left for their homes. Many bodies of the dead have not been identified and these remain at the undertaking establishments awaiting to be claimed by relatives or friends.
The latter are principally bodies of negro section hands.
The number in the gang which was making its way to do repair work on the Georgia, Midland and Gulf railway is not known. All of them perished. It is supposed to have numbered about fifteen, which will make the total casualties about forty. It is believed that some dead bodies are still buried under the debris, which will be thoroughly cleared away by tomorrow. Traffic will likely be resumed in twelve hours. Trains from Macon to Atlanta are now operating over the Georgia Midland and Gulf railroad.
During the recent heavy rains vigilance has been exercised by railroad officials in watching the roadbed and it is said that the culvert over Camp Creek, where the wreck occurred, was inspected and reported "O. K." thirty minutes before the train ran into the ditch. The culvert over Camp creek gave way because the water rose to a height sufficient to get in between the abutment walls and the earthen embankments. It was constructed of stone and brick. The embankment is about fifty feet high at this point and quite long.
A dispatch from McDonough tonight says one of the unidentified bodies is believed to be that of W. H. Jensen, Sr., of Sugar post office, Salt Lake county, Utah.
RACING DELEGATES.
