WORK OF ARCHITECTS.

Plans for Ware Houses and Barns. New Hotel to be Built—Cottages in Great Demand.

"I have drawn plans for a two story brick business house on Bowie street, between Pearl and Orleans," said Mr. George Francis, architect, this morning. "The building will be for stores and offices. I have also drawn plans for a three story frame hotel on the east corner of Fannin and Sabine street, which will cost about \$8000. ROMANCE IN LANDS.

Dr. Graham, of Savannah, offered \$4,000,000 for 200 Acres.

ROMANCE OF THE OIL FIELDS.

The Lands are Situated in Hardin County, near Beaumont, and in Liberty.

Dr. St. J. B. Graham, of Savannah, Ga., arrived in the city this morning and is stopping at the Crosby. Dr. Graham is a practicing physician at Savannah and he is also a prospective millionaire. He owns forty acres of oil lands in Hardin county, for which he has been offered \$25,000 an acre, or \$1,000,000. He also holds the power-of-attorney to sell 160 acres of land situated in Hardin and Liberty counties, for which he has also been offered \$25,000 an acre, or \$4,000,000. He has a half interest in this 160 acres, or is authorized to sell it for the best price it will bring, and will receive, it is reported, half of the proceeds. At these figures Dr. Graham may be rated as worth \$3,000,000. However, he refuses to sell the lands at these figures—\$5,000,000.

Dr. Graham was seen at the Crosby hotel this morning by an Enterprise reporter. He said: "I own forty acres of land in Hardin county, just over the line from Jefferson county; and I am agent for the owner of 160 acres of land lying in Hardin and Liberty counties. The owner is sick in Colorado, and I have his power-of-attorney to sell his land to the best advantage. These lands lie north of Beaumont, but just how far I do not know. My visit here is to learn the situation more particularly."

Dr. Graham made inquiries of the reporter as to the distance of his forty acre tract from Beaumont, and the situation generally. He continued: "I have known all the time that these lands were valuable, especially after the oil strike in Beaumont, and I became more firmly convinced that they were very valuable when I received some time ago an offer from Mr. Watson, who is drilling a well on lands adjoining my forty acre tract. He is connected with a wealthy syndicate in St. Paul, Minn. He first offered me \$1,250 an acre, then \$2,000, and then \$3,000 and finally \$25,000 an acre. Yes this was for the two tracts—200 acres. He was in Montgomery, Ala., a day or two ago, and called me up by telephone. Our long distance conversation lasted half an hour. I expect to meet him here.

"No, I will not sell all of these lands but perhaps shall sell a part of them. No, I do not intend to organize a stock company, but will sell the lands myself. I shall remain here several days and perhaps tomorrow I will visit my lands."

The owner of the 160 acres for the sale of which Dr. Graham has a power-of-attorney is a colored man named Brown. Dr. Graham would only state that the colored man was now in Colorado, where he had gone for his health. The colored man was befriended during his early life by the father of Dr. Graham, hence his gratitude and friendship for Dr. Graham, to whom he has entrusted his interests.

Dr. Graham is a native of Harrisburg, Ky., the oldest town in the state. His ancestors were among the earliest settlers of Kentucky county, when it was a part of the state of Virginia. Dr. Graham is a well educated young gentleman, and served three years as a medical staff officer in the West before locating at Savannah. His wife is traveling in Europe.

REAL ESTATE IS ACTIVE.

Inquiries for City and Country Property—Not Enough Residence Houses for the Increasing Population.

"There is a steady demand for city property," said Mr. Oswald of the real estate firm of Oswald and Blevins. "The demand is principally for residence lots and residence buildings. A great many people are coming to the city with a view of locating but there are not enough houses to accommodate them. Building lots are also high and it is with much difficulty that we can induce holders of sell. Real estate, generally, has about doubled in value within the past six months. There may be instances where prices are even higher and some where they are lower, but this is the average, generally speaking. The outlook for the future is very promising and good. We have many inquiries from Kansas and Oklahoma, for town and country property, and for oil lands. We are keeping them posted on the situation, and when the weather is a little cooler there will be quite a rush to this city. They are business men, know what they want, and have got the money to buy it. There will no doubt be a great activity in business along in the fall, but there will be no wild rush like there was a few months ago. It will be a solid business boom. Capitalists all over the United States are watching Beaumont and are keeping posted. I look for very good progress this fall and winter."

"We cannot supply the demand for residence houses," said Mr. J. V. Polk of the real estate firm of Polk and company. "We have inquiries constantly for all kinds of property—residences, stores and lands, but the greatest demands is for residence houses, and most of these applicants want them close in. The city is rapidly filling up with people, hence the increased demand for houses. As they are business men, they want houses close in. A ten room residence within eight blocks of the center of the city readily rents for \$30 a month; a six room residence rents for about \$25 a month and a cottage of four rooms will rent at from \$12 to \$15 a month according to location. The demand is steadily increasing for residences and, from present indications, will no doubt continue. The outlook for real estate is very good."

PROSPEROUS SILSBEE.

Mr. James L. Kirby of Silsbee is at the Crosby. Mr. Kirby said to an Enterprise reporter this morning: "There is no land for sale in our town, nor in its vicinity. The town has a population of about 400 people, and while not many people are coming in, the owners hold on to their property. The surrounding lands are good for fruit raising, and our fruit crops are as varied and as large as in most other parts of Texas. The pine lands average about 5000 feet of timber to the acre. A great deal of timber has been cut away, but we have plenty more. There are several saw mills near Silsbee, and they do a good business."
