NATHAN SELLS IT FOR LESS.

It is announced that Beaumont is shortly to have a semi monthly oil paper which shall be conducted with a view of creditably representing the great oil industry of Southeast Texas. The development of the Beaumont field has now reached a stage when the promoters think it is necessary that the interests of the new industry should be properly reflected in a publication which shall be devoted to this purpose. Such a paper will keep the Jefferson county oil field constantly before the eyes of the public of the entire country and, what is more important, it will circulate in the trade centers and will be read in the offices of trade journals throughout the United States and Europe. It will be prepared in a manner both as to typographical appearance and to nature of its contents, that will command respect not only for itself, but for the field which it represents. The gentlemen who will have the active editorial and business management of the paper are young men, but they have grown up in the newspaper business, and are thoroughly conversant with the requirements of a publication such as they will issue. Holland S. Reavis who will have the editorial management, has handled correspondence and advertising for the St. Louis Republic in Beaumont for three months. Ellis E. Beebe, who has been here an equal length of time, came as the representative of the Memphis Scimitar, and he will look after the business end of the paper. It will be incorporated as the Beaumont Oil News, and all the capital stock will be held by the organizers. None will be offered for sale. The expenses of the paper will be paid out of its legitimate earnings. The first issue will appear on or about September 16.

FUEL OIL ON DREDGES.

Galveston News.
First attempts to use fuel oil in floating property will be made about Wednesday on the Bowers Southern Dredging company's dredge No. 6, now employed on the work at the Southern Pacific docks.

This will be followed by the installation of the necessary apparatus on No. 7, now employed on the Buffalo Bayou work, and on No. 4, which is on the marine ways.

Oil is to be introduced on the steel tugs Charles Clarke and Seminole, belonging to Charles Clarke and company. It is hoped to install these several oil burning plants on the various vessels by the end of the month. That on No. 6, barring accidents, will be in working order by Wednesday. No. 7 is to follow quickly, as the apparatus is here ready for the installation and No. 4 will receive hers as soon as she comes off the marine ways, but there may be some delay in the tanks.

Mr. Robert Clarke, in speaking of the installation of these oil burning plants, stated yesterday that the saving of two weeks operations would pay for the installation and the saving on fuel would amount to \$5000 a month. This he considers a big item, which it is under ordinary circumstances, but several contracts on which they are working were figured on a basis of a cheaper price for coal than that which they now have to pay. The rising price of coal makes the present cost of fuel oil about one third that of coal, by which fortunate circumstance, the discovery of oil at Beaumont, the company will be enabled to realize the profits that were originally anticipated when the bids were made.

Barge No. 1 of the oil service of Charles Clarke and company is expected to be out about the end of the week. She will probably be used to keep the vessels of the company supplied with oil, but as yet no arrangement for the storage of oil has been perfected, so that what oil is to be brought here will have to be stored in limited quantities in the tanks of the various vessels. All that is necessary to the completion of this barge is the connecting of the machinery for loading and discharging.

The success of this project will be watched with considerable interest by the other owners of marine property here, as practically all of them have rather been afraid to take the initiative in the matter, preferring that somebody else should stand the brunt of the pioneer. But with Charles Clarke and company out of the coal consuming list a big hole is made in the coal business of the harbor craft, and a bigger hole is to be made within the next few months.

CORONATION RIGHTS CLAIMED.

London.—The members of the privy council sat as a court of claims the other day to consider various hereditary traditional rights and privileges claimed in connection with the forthcoming coronation of the King. A long list of quaint demands was presented. After the registrar had commanded all persons to keep silence on penalty of imprisonment, he read thirty or forty demands, including the following:
The Duke of Norfolk—To act as chief butler of England.
The Duke of Newcastle—To provide a glove to support the King's arm.
The Bishop of Durham—To support the King and Queen.
The Duke of Somerset—To carry the orb.
The Earl of Erroll—To have the silver baton tipped with gold.
The Dean of Westminster—To instruct the King and Queen in the rights and ceremonies and to have the cloth, etc., as fees.
Lord Grey de Ruthyn—To carry the golden spurs.

Colonel Brown—To bear the canopy over the King and Queen.

The Earl of Shrewsbury—To provide the glove for the King's right hand and support the hand whilst holding the scepter.

Sir Wyndham Anstuther—Grand carver for Scotland.

The Duke of Buccleuch—To ride by his majesty's carriage.

The Marquis of Winchester—To carry the cap of maintenance.

The Lord Chancellor announced that all claims must be presented by Oct. 31, and the court then adjourned.
