Something like 9,000 or 10,000 logs came out on the water made by the rain of week before last, and now we believe that a large part of all the timber cut will come out, perhaps 30,000 to 40,000 logs. It is sure to come out if the rain continues two or three days more.

It has been raining all the week, and the town has been almost as quiet as a Quaker Meeting-House. A great many of our townsmen are directly interested in the timber business, and as the streams are all full, they have gone to the woods and taken all the available help with them to assist in getting out their timber.
