A gentleman from Lacassine was observing the other day, that ever since the first settlement made in that part of the parish of Calcasieu, there was no recollection of any crime ever having been committed in that locality, of sufficient gravity to require interference before the courts, except the unfortunate occurrence of last spring, when a young man by the name of Oscar Martin, shot at and wounded his father, and from all appearances this young man is insane. There is no record, either, of any civil suit, except one, ever having had its origin among the residents of the same section. The Lacassine settlement is one of the oldest of Calcasieu. This record is such an honorable evidence of the honesty, morality and peace-loving disposition of its inhabitants, that we doubt very much whether another such an instance could be found, after the most diligent search, among the records of a whole country. The Police Jury.

The Police Jury met last Monday in regular session, and as a Board of Reviewers of the assessment rolls.

Early in the session they appointed a committee of three, composed of Messrs. D. D. Andrus, A. D. McFarlain and F. M. Rowe, to meet a similar committee from the parish of St. Landry, to consult as to the location and estimate of the cost of building a bridge over Bayou Nez-Pigue.

They also appropriated \$250 to assist in building a bridge over Barnes' Creek, at J. J. Kingrey's. This sum was appropriated about a year ago to assist in building a bridge near J. J. Lyles', on the same creek, but as nothing has been done toward building it the Police Jury decided to give it to the other bridge, at Kingrey's, provided the Lyles bridge is not built by Sept. 1st.

They have also made a start towards building a new jail. They authorized the Clerk of the Police Jury to enter into correspondence with different jail builders, and solicit them to submit plans, specifications and estimates, either in person or by letter, at the next session of the Police Jury, the 1st of Oct. next.

Another good thing done, was the ordering the removal of one of the buildings on the Lake front, which had been complained of as a nuisance. If the Police Jury had gone further, and ordered the removal of all the buildings on the Lake front of the Public Square, they would have done better.

The Police Jury expect to complete the work of reviewing the assessment rolls this evening, when they will adjourn until the 1st of October next.

The force of this practical illustration of the folly of paying such an exorbitant price for the use of money was such that the merchant determined never to borrow at such ruinous rates, and he frequently used to say that nothing could have so fully convinced him as this rather humorous proposal by Mr. Cooper.
