

Good Advice for Everybody.

How an Arab Lady Perfumes Herself.

In the floor of the tent or hut, as it may chance to be, a small hole is excavated sufficiently large to contain a common champagne bottle, a fire of charcoal or of simply glowing embers is made within the hole, into which the woman about to be scented throws a handful of drugs. She then takes off the cloth or "tops" which form her dress, and crouches naked over the fumes, while she arranges her robes to fall as a mantle from her neck to the ground like a tent. She now begins to perspire freely in the hot air bath, and the pores of the skin being thus opened and moist, the volatile from the smoke of the burning perfumes is immediately absorbed. By the time that the fire has expired, the scenting process is completed, and both her person and robe are redolent with incense, with which they are so thoroughly impregnated that I have frequently smelt a party of women strongly at full a hundred yards distance when the wind has been blowing from their direction.

A Vegetable Curiosity.

A remarkable freak of vegetation has appeared in the grounds of R. B. Tatman at Worcester, in the shape of a potato-vine which bears tomatoes. It appears to be a mixture of the two vegetables, and is accounted for by the fact that a strong tomato-vine from chance-sown seed grew in the same hill with the potatoes, and the pollen of the two plants became mixed. Unfortunately the vines were pulled up before the peculiarity of the growth was noticed. Some of our agriculturists may derive a valuable suggestion from this. As both the potato and the tomato are of the solanaceae family, it is not impossible that one should be fertilized by the other, and a remarkable economy of labor might be effected if careful and scientific cultivation should produce a plant which would bear good potatoes on top.—Ex.

A Human Lucifer.

Lighting gas with the finger is a feat anybody may perform. Let a person, in his slippers, walk briskly over a woolen carpet, shuffling his feet thereon, or stand upon a chair, with his legs upon four tumbler to insulate it, and be thereon rubbed up and down on the body a few times with a muff, by a second individual, and he will light his gas by simply placing his finger to the tube. It is only necessary to take the precaution not to touch anybody during the trial of the experiment. The shock of electricity acquired by the process we have described is discharged by contact with another object. One person must turn on the gas while the other fires it.

A hotel in Boston built of stone and brick 96 and 69 feet frontage with basement and seven stories above the sidewalk, was moved nearly 100 feet in order to make a change in the street. One side was supported by eight granite columns twelve feet high, the whole building weighing 5,000 tons beside the furniture.
