Progress of the Pittsburg and Gulf.

Within the next ten days the Kansas City, Pittsburg and Gulf Railway will be completed to the Arkansas river, says the Kansas City Star. The laying of iron north of Poteau has been finished to within six miles of the river. The road has been graded almost to the point where it is to cross from the Indian Territory into Arkansas, or a distance of 366 miles from Kansas City. The gap fifty miles north of Horatio, Ark., will soon be completed and trains will be running between Kansas City and Shreveport, La., about February.

Three locating parties are in the field between Shreveport and Port Arthur on the Gulf of Mexico, and contracts for the road will soon be let. The contracts will be let privately by the company, and in order to expedite the work no contractor will be given more than twenty-five miles of road to build.

President E. L. Martin and Chief Engineer Gillham of the Pittsburg and Gulf has recently returned from an extended trip over the line. Plans for docks, jetties, etc., at Port Arthur have been prepared. Work on a large hotel with 100 rooms has also been started at that point. At Shreveport \$100,000 will be spent on depot improvements. It is intended to build a union depot for the use of the Pittsburg and Gulf, the Texas and Pacific, Cotton Belt and East and West Texas lines.

Eureka Band Officers. On Monday night, last, the famous Eureka Brass Band held a business meeting, at which five new members were enrolled and the annual election of officers took place. The new officers are D. C. Taylor, leader and manager; Chas. Schmidt, musical director; Louis Runte, secretary, and Ferdinand Roy, treasurer.
