Were Our Merchants Asleep? Last Saturday morning Mr. W. R. Fletcher, from the northern part of the parish, was in town with a load of three thousand pounds of wool. Mr. Fletcher, we understand, could not find a purchaser among our merchants and finally came across Mr. W. H. Graves, the bustling business manager of the Perkins & Miller store at Westlake, and in whom Mr. Fletcher found an anxious purchaser. The wagon of wool was ferried across the lake, and before the transaction had come to an end Mr. Fletcher purchased over two hundred dollars worth of supplies from Mr. Graves. Mr. Fletcher recrossed the lake and started for his far distant home as happy as could be. We are at a loss to know how it is that our merchants let such trade as that slip away from them. We did not see the price of this lot of wool, but would that Louisiana wool is quoted at 12 and 12-1/2 cents.

Come Down to Facts. The Press of last Wednesday contained an article relative to the COMMERCIAL's suit with the parish, and in which the writer completely ignored the real facts in the case. It says "the law is explicit in regard to electing a parish printer, and at the meeting of the police jury on the first Monday in July, 1896, they proceeded, under advice from their attorney, to elect a printer, whose term of office began then. Joe. F. Reed was elected, etc." Here we wish to inform the young writer of the Press that he is mistaken regarding the day of election, for Mr. Reed was not elected until Friday, July 17th, the last day of the session. Again, he is wrong in stating that "at that meeting, while the police jury was yet in session, Mr. Reed filed the required bond and the minutes were turned over to him by the police jury clerk." The truth of the matter is that Mr. Reed's bond was not accepted until July 22, and the proceedings were never turned over to him at all, for we yet have the original copy in our possession. We will state further that the proceedings were up in type before the bond was a bond, and that the proceedings appeared in this paper two weeks before they were published by the Press, they having copied them from the COMMERCIAL. These are the facts upon which the COMMERCIAL won its suit, and whether or not they suit the Press we care very little. As to the amount paid the Press being a dead loss to the taxpayers of the parish, the Press "states it authentically that if the police jury have made an error they will stand good for the damage." This is just as it should be, for the taxpayers should not have to pay twice for one thing.

The Charter Squabble. Our people are considerably stirred up over the very serious condition of affairs that has come to the front since the filing of the injunction suit against the city. At the council meeting last Monday night it was learned from Chairman Lyons, of finance committee, that the city banks had positively refused to loan money to run the city government until fall, owing to the uncertainty of the legality of the city charter. Mr. Lyons' report before the council was the cause of considerable talk on the part of the aldermen. Some thought the best thing now to do would be to discharge all city officials, while others thought different. It was finally decided that a committee consisting of Mayor Crowley, Aldermen McCain and Kirkwood, be appointed to confer with representative citizens, the Board of Trade and Commercial Club, to see if something could not be done to abridge this crisis. The monthly expenses of the city will reach about one thousand dollars, without a dollar on hand or in sight until the fall tax money will commence coming in. Things now are in a muddle to say the least of it, and the prospects for a better state of affairs will remain in the dark until the courts will decide the legality of our charter. We hope the committee appointed will be successful in raising means to run the city's affairs until the court's decision is rendered.

The Bicycle Fence. District Attorney Mitchell's bicycle fence came in for a big share of attention at the city council meeting last Monday evening. Some of the aldermen were of the opinion that it was a public nuisance, while others took a different view of the matter. It was finally decided that City Engineer Klempeter should investigate who owned the sidewalk in front of Mr. Mitchell's property. It is evident that if the city owns the sidewalk, the fence will be pulled down, and if not, the "citizen's" will stand.
