

## National Army Troops Reviewed Today at Camp Jackson, Columbia

Columbia, Nov. 7.—National Army troops at Camp Jackson comprising eight-first division were reviewed this morning for the first time before Major Gen. Charles J. Bailey, commander of the camp. It is estimated that 17,000 were in line and every officer and enlisted man in the cantonment passed in review before General Bailey and his staff.

## Little Activity on Ypres Front; Italians Making Safe Retreat

War Front, Nov. 7.—The German forces made no effort during the night to regain the ground captured from them yesterday by the British on the Ypres front, according to London reports, confining their retaliation to intermittent artillery activity on the Verdun front at Chemin wood. The crown prince's forces made another stab at French armies, but met with a repulse. The Italian statements say the Italians have withdrawn in good order from Tagliamento river toward Livensea next river behind Tagliamento. Retreat apparently not to be taken as seriously as that from Isonzo. Italians are falling back steady with rear guards in constant touch with German scouts.

He says he does not mind the cold weather so much, but has to bundle up so to fly that he can neither look around or walk. For instance, when he makes the flights this is what he wears: One pair of thin silk socks; two pair of very heavy army woolen socks, army shoes and puttees, B. V. D. union suit, two pair of trousers, one woolen army shirt, heavy sweater and leather coat, one pair of thin kid gloves, one pair of heavy fur-lined gauntlets, two knit helmets, one leather aviator's helmet with goggles that completely cover the face. He says it is rather warm down on the ground with all this garb on, but up about 3,500 feet, his knees, fingers, lips, nose and feet ache with the cold.

The aviators fly 30 minutes morning and afternoon and Dogan is having the time of his life, if he does have to wear all his clothes at one time.

## American Patrol Vessel Lost: One Officer and Twenty Men

Washington, Nov. 7.—Navy department is today awaiting complete report torpedoing of the American patrol vessel Alcedo, which was sunk in the war zone early Monday with the probable loss of one officer and 20 men. Seventy-one were rescued, but little hope is held for those reported missing, as the vessel sunk in four minutes after being hit.

Washington, Nov. 6.—The American patrol boat Alcedo was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine in the war zone early Monday morning and one officer and twenty enlisted men are missing. The Alcedo, a converted yacht, carried a crew of seven officers and eighty-five men. The Navy Department announced the disaster tonight in this statement: "The Navy Department has been advised by Vice Admiral Sims, at 10:30 a. m., November 4, the American patrol boat Alcedo, a converted yacht, was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine in the war zone. One officer and twenty men are missing. The ship sank in four minutes after being struck.

"Several vessels were searching for possible survivors at the time the report was made. The Alcedo carried a crew of seven officers and eighty five men."
