## GOOD CROPS IN CANADA.

Farmers Leave Good Lands in Minnesota for Western Canada.  
Delegates representing a number of neighboring farmers in Clay county, Minnesota, who visited the Edmonton district of Western Canada last summer are evidently very well satisfied with the result of their trip. They think so well of the country that in addition to the privilege of obtaining a free homestead of 160 acres of land they have also purchased land. In a recent interview on the subject Messrs. C. E. and A. Hughes of Barnesville, Clay Co., say:

"We are well pleased with Western Canada. It is far ahead of what we expected. We find the climate to be warmer than we expected. As for the crops we have never seen anything that can compete with them. We have lived in Minnesota and have farmed some of what they count the best lands in the Red River Valley for ten years and have done very well in that part of the country, and have farms there at present free of all encumbrance, but believe that this country (Western Canada) is so much better that we have bought from the Canadian Pacific Railway Company one section of land northeast of Edmonton in the Beaver Hill district. We have traveled through that part of the country and have seen the grain in the granaries and the amount of land that it was taken off and find that they have grown as much as fifty bushels and over to the acre, and they say that this has not been a good year, and very little if any grain had been touched by the frost. Hay seems to be plentiful, and if you wish to put up log buildings you can get the logs within a few miles. Coal can be had at the mines for 75 cents per ton, or you can dig it yourself. Nearly all kinds of garden truck can be grown in abundance. We find everything that can be grown in good demand. The farmers tell us that they can get four and a half live weight per hundred for hogs, and for three year old steers from fifty to sixty dollars per head, providing they are good. We will move into that part of the country next summer. All the people in that part of the country seem satisfied, and we do not see any reason why they should not be so."

The Messrs. Hughes also stated that they would be very glad to afford anyone desiring particulars about the country they had visited the fullest information, on receiving enquiries at Barnesville, Clay Co., before the 1st of June next, when it is understood they propose to return to the Edmonton district.

**An Economical Rail.**  
Chief Engineer W. T. Manning, of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, has invented a new rail that experts say has many points of interest to railroad owners, the principal one being its economical feature. It is well known that rails wear rapidly on curves, and where these are short and traffic heavy, the cost of renewal is very large. Manning has evolved a section, which he asserts, will reduce the cost 37 1/2 per cent. He adds materially to the life of the rail by placing additional metal in the head and on the side upon which the wear comes.

It is this fire warden law that Representative Brusletten, of Goodhue county, has introduced a bill to repeal.

## QUARLES WILL BE SENATOR

WISCONSIN'S SENATORIAL DEADLOCK IS BROKEN.

Quarles Receives the Unanimous Nomination in the Republican Caucus—The Other Candidates All Withdraw From the Race, Leaving a Clear Field to the Milwaukee Man—Keenest Interest Was Manifested in the Caucus, as It Was the Belief That Something Would Happen.

Madison Wis., Feb. 1. — The senatorial deadlock was broken last night according to arranged programme of the Milwaukee conference and Joseph V. Quarles of Milwaukee was nominated in the Republican caucus to succeed John L. Mitchell, whose term expired on March 4. Chairman Taylor dropped the floor and formally at 8 o'clock, and after a few moments of the presence of a quorum. A big crowd filled the lobby in expectation of a nomination. So general was the belief that something was about to happen that the keenest interest was manifested on every face. Everybody was active, the Babcock workers especially, rushing around the chamber passing some urgent message to their followers. When the roll call was ended, Assemblyman Zinn of Milwaukee got the floor and formally withdrew the name of Isaac Stephenson as a candidate. He said: "Mr. Stephenson's withdrawal leaves his supporters free to vote as they wish, and I for one, will henceforth vote for J. V. Quarles." Mr. Zinn's statement was greeted with an outburst of applause and he sat down with a smile of satisfaction on his face. Senator McGilivray then took the floor and withdrew Congressman Babcock's name. "It is Mr. Babcock's wish," said Senator McGilivray, "that harmony be preserved, and he desires that his name be withdrawn for the good of the Republican party. His withdrawal leaves his supporters free to vote as they wish." Another burst of applause and Assemblyman Williams got the floor and withdrew Mr. Cook's name. "On behalf of Mr. Cook," said Mr. Williams, "I desire to thank the members who have supported Mr. Cook, and withdraw his name from the list of candidates. All those who have supported him are free to vote as they wish." Senator Hatton, of the Webb following, then withdrew Judge Webb's name in almost the same words, and the roll call was ordered.

A few names were called by Secretary Ray, when Senator Hatton moved that the nomination be made unanimous. The chairman ruled the motion out of order as the roll call had been begun, but said he would put the motion if there was no objection. Senator Green objected and wanted the roll called, and it was done, every one voting "Quarles" with a shout but Assemblyman Daggett, who came in during the roll call, and not knowing what was going on voted "Stephenson" amidst laughter. He afterward changed to Quarles and the vote was made unanimous.

## REMOVED BY LIND.

James S. O'Brien Deposed as President of the Prison Board.  
St. Paul, Feb. 1. — Gov. Lind has removed or will remove J. S. O'Brien as president of the state board of prison managers and will send to the senate the name of David Bronson of Stillwater as his successor. Mr. O'Brien contends that the governor has no right to remove him, and appeals for a hearing before an impartial body. What the senate will see fit to do remains for the next chapter. Mr. O'Brien was a candidate for surveyor general under Lind, saw the governor about it twice, two weeks ago Friday, again the next day. Both times, the governor says, Mr. O'Brien intimated, not, perhaps in just those words, but with unmistakable meaning, that if Lind would appoint him surveyor general O'Brien would be his friend on the prison board, otherwise they wouldn't be able to get along together. Mr. O'Brien takes his oath he never said anything of the kind.

## FAREWELL TO THE THIRD.

Regiment Starts on its Long Trip to Manila.  
St. Paul, Feb. 1. — Notwithstanding the extremely cold weather a large crowd of citizens turned out to bid God speed to the gallant boys from Fort Snelling. Many of the soldiers were not properly clothed to withstand the rigors of 30-below-zero weather and suffered intensely from the cold. A number received severe frost bites and required the attention of the surgeons. The regiment travels over three different lines and will reach the coast in two days.

**Mrs. P. H. Kelly Dead.**  
St. Paul, Feb. 1.—Mrs. Mary A. E. Kelly, wife of P. H. Kelly, the wholesale grocer of St. Paul, died at her home in this city from a complication of diseases. Mrs. Kelly came to St. Anthony thirty-seven years ago, but soon afterward moved to St. Paul with her husband.

**Railroader Killed.**  
West Superior, Wis., Feb. 1.—Thomas Doud was killed on the Omaha train bound for Duluth. He was leaning out from a car platform and struck his head on a semaphore post. Death was instantaneous.

**The Money Was Bad.**  
Sioux Falls, S. D., Feb. 1. — James West and Edward McCarthy had a preliminary examination before Commissioner Conroy on a charge of passing counterfeit money. West was held but McCarthy was discharged.

**Too Many Wolves.**  
Reedsburg, Wis., Feb. 1. — Wolves are so numerous in this section that they are a nuisance. A hunting party has been organized and will try to rid the county of a few. They are the large timber wolves.

## GEN. EAGAN IS FOUND GUILTY

COURT-MARTIAL RECOMMENDS EXECUTIVE CLEMENCY.

Charges of Conduct Unbecoming an Officer and a Gentleman and of Conduct to the Prejudice of Good Order and Discipline Are Sustained—Papers Now in the Hands of Secretary Alger—After Review by Him They Will Go to the President—Dismissal From Office the Only Penalty the Court Could Prescribe.

Washington, Jan. 31. — Gen. Eagan, commissary general of subsistence, has been found guilty of the charges of conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman and of conduct to the prejudice of good order and discipline and of the specifications thereto and has been sentenced to dismissal from the United States army, but with a recommendation from the court for the exercise of executive clemency. Under the regulations the court has reached the conclusion that the accused was guilty and it had no choice in selecting a penalty, for the regulations provided for the one penalty—dismissal from office. Therefore, the only hope for Gen. Eagan is in the direction of commutation, revision or disapproval.

Col. Davis, judge advocate of the court martial, finished his revision of the court's proceedings and at once placed the papers in the hands of Secretary Alger. This action settled at once any doubt that may have existed as to the routine to be pursued in the treatment of the case. As soon as he has read the record Secretary Alger will place it in the hands of the president, who, under the law, is the final reviewing authority. It is his privilege to add to or take from the strength of the court's recommendation that clemency be shown. The indications are that the papers will be in the president's hands early this week.

## PEACE TREATY EXPLAINED.

Senator Frye Helps Satisfy the Curious.

Washington, Jan. 31.—Senator Frye continued his argument for the ratification of the peace treaty with Spain in the executive session of the senate. He talked an hour and a half and again made the only speech of the day's session. The principal questions under consideration were Spanish government, the reasons for agreeing to pay Spain for the improvements made in the Philippines and reasons for extending to Spain the benefit of an open-door policy in her former possessions. There were various interruptions by other senators, who, however, confined themselves to questions. In reply to one of these questions relating to the president's instructions, Mr. Frye said the commissioners were in constant communication with the president, and the latter had cabled them on more than one occasion to use their best judgment in reaching conclusions and recording results.

## GEN. GOMEZ.

Cuban Officer Will Probably Call on President at McKinley Soon.  
New York, Jan. 31.—A special from Washington says: Gen. Maximo Gomez may come to Washington. The suggestion has been made that a meeting between the president and Gomez would be of great benefit. Gomez wishes to come. His desire has been communicated to a United States senator who visited Cuba a year ago. The communication was made to this senator in the hope that he might find some way of bringing about the visit. Senor Quesada, the head of the Cuban organization in Washington, has started for Havana. His destination, however, is the interior of the island. Further than that, Senor Quesada goes on an important mission to Gen. Gomez. The Cubans here will not say, but it is believed to be in connection with the visit.

## POSTAL SERVICE IN CUBA.

Arrangements Are Being Vigorously Pushed.  
Washington, Jan. 31.—The postal service in Cuba is being very vigorously pushed under the direction of ex-Assistant Postmaster General Rathbone at Havana, and military postal stations in connection with the New York city postoffice, and having money order and registry facilities, have been ordered established at seven more of the large towns. They are Palmetto, Santo Domingo, Sagua la Grande, in Santa Clara province; Batabano and Juraco, Havana province, and Santa Cruz, Puerto Principe province. These make thirty-three military postal stations there in all.

## LET OUT BROOKE.

The President Will Make Gen. Wood Military Governor of Cuba.  
New York, Jan. 31.—A special to the Journal and Advertiser from Washington says: It is announced on excellent authority that the president has decided to remove Gen. Brooke, military governor of Cuba, and appoint Gen. Leonard Wood in his place. Gen. Wood is scheduled for second in command.

**Drifting Ashore.**  
Astoria, Or., Jan. 28.—A special messenger from Canon Beach reports a four-masted ship going ashore at Silver Cliff, below Seaside. There is no wind and it is supposed she is being taken in by the current. Cannon are being fired and the crew is about to abandon the vessel.

**Barn and Horses Burned.**  
Ipswich, S. D., Jan. 28.—Alec Bouchet, landlord of the French hotel, has lost his barn by fire. Also three horses were burned. No insurance.
