

# FOR ST. LOUIS FAIR

## THE SENATE MAKES AN APPROPRIATION OF \$5,000,000.

### Exposition Authorities Must Raise \$10,000,000 in Addition to Be Entitled to the Appropriation—Senate Adopts the Amendment Without Division—The House Refuses to Concur in the Senate Amendments to the Naval Appropriation Bill Relating to Armor Plate and Adopted a New Provision.

Washington, May 30.—A few minutes before adjournment last evening the senate added to the sundry civil appropriation bill an amendment appropriating \$5,000,000 for the Louisiana purchase exposition to be held in St. Louis in 1903 on condition that \$10,000,000 in addition be raised by the exposition authorities. The amendment was offered by Mr. Cockrell of Missouri and was adopted without debate and without division. Because an amendment offered by him subsequently was stricken out on a point of order, Mr. Gallinger of New Hampshire moved to reconsider the St. Louis fair appropriation and the motion is now pending. As it is known that a considerable number favor the appropriation it is very probable the motion will not be adopted. Mr. Bacon addressed the senate at length in support of the Teller amendment expressing sympathy with the Boers, after which the resolution was sent to the committee on foreign relations by a vote of 40 to 21. Mr. Fairbank of Indiana endeavored to secure consideration of a resolution providing for the extradition of criminals from the United States to Cuba, but Mr. Allison declined to lay aside the appropriation bill for that purpose. No session of the senate will be held to-day.

### The House.

The house yesterday refused to accept the senate amendment to the naval appropriation bill relating to armor plate, and adopted a modified proposition reading as follows: "That the secretary of the navy is hereby authorized to procure by contract armor of the best quality for any or all vessels above referred to, provided such contracts can be made at a price which, in his judgment, is reasonable and equitable; but in case he is unable to make contracts for armor under the above conditions, he is hereby authorized in his discretion to procure a site for and to erect thereon a factory for the manufacture of armor and the sum of \$4,000,000 is hereby appropriated toward the erection of said factory." With regard to ocean and lake surveys the house refused any appropriation for surveys by the navy and tied up the conferees with instructions. It also refused to concur in the senate amendment to abolish the two-year sea cruise for naval cadets. With the above action the naval bill was sent back to conference, the conference report on the other items having been agreed to. The conference report on the postoffice appropriation bill relating to all items excepting \$225,000 for pneumatic tube service was adopted and the house then concurred in the excepted amendment.

### DEMOCRATS IN CAUCUS.

#### They Favor an Immediate Reduction of War Taxes.

Washington, May 31.—The Democratic members of the house of representatives held a caucus last night in the hall of the house to consider the trust measure which will be brought up for discussion in the house this week and other important legislation. There were present about eighty Democratic members. Mr. McRae of Arkansas acted as chairman and Mr. Cummings of New York, secretary. At the outset Mr. Richardson of Tennessee offered the following resolution expressive of the party attitude:

"Whereas, there is known to be a large growing surplus in the treasury over and above the necessities of the government arising out of taxes levied and collected under the war revenue act of 1898, therefore,

"Resolved, That we favor the reduction of the taxes provided for in said bill, and we do not think the present session of congress should adjourn until said taxes shall have been repealed as to certain articles and reduced as to others until there is a total reduction in the aggregate of at least 50 per cent.

"We pledge ourselves at all times to support any measure or measures providing for such reduction."

### MANY PASSPORTS.

#### Large Number Taken Out by Americans Going to Europe.

Washington, May 31.—The state department has issued over 3,000 passports to European travelers for the twenty-eight days in May. It is said that the climax has been reached, and that from this on the issues will diminish. As it is, the figures show a gain of over 50 per cent above the normal passport issues for May. The figures for April were 3,064, in that case a gain of more than 100 per cent over the normal business. Most of these travelers are going to Paris, yet it is said at the state department that during the last portion of the first quarter of 1900, and that part of the second quarter which has already elapsed, there has been an unusually large number of applications for passports from American merchants and commercial travelers bound abroad on business.

### Killed an Owl.

Ardmore, Ind. T., May 31.—In the hills near Vain, in the Chestnut Nation, a fight occurred between a number of deputy marshals and a gang of horse thieves. One outlaw was killed and two arrested. Others escaped.

### Killed by Lightning.

Springfield, Ill., May 31.—George Osterhoff, aged 35, and Clyde D. Williams, aged 17, were found dead under an elm tree near here, where they had taken refuge during a storm. Lightning struck the tree.

### NEWS IN BRIEF.

#### Overflow From the Wires in a Condensed Form.

Fire at Syracuse did \$75,000 damage to the five-story brick block occupied by R. A. Stowell's department store.

The French chamber of deputies had an exciting session over the Dreyfus case, but the chamber voted confidence in the government.

Willard A. Cobb, editor of the Journal of Lockport, N. Y., and president of the state civil service commission, died suddenly, aged fifty-five years.

Ahmed Ben Mussa, the late grand vizier of Morocco, left a fortune of \$1,000,000 which was stored in the fortress of the palace at Marakesh.

The general elections in Belgium have resulted in a reduction of the Catholic majority from 102 to 85. The Socialists are the gainers by the change.

Determined efforts will be made by the navy department during the next session of congress to secure authority for the establishment of a national naval reserve.

Fred R. Luce, secretary of the Luce Furniture company, Grand Rapids, fatally shot himself while in a fit of temporary insanity. He was forty-three years old and wealthy.

Theodore R. Rand, chancellor of the university at Toronto, was stricken with heart failure while participating in the exercises of the University of New Brunswick at Fredericton, N. B., and died shortly afterward. He was sixty-three years of age.

Baron de Rheinbaben, Prussian minister of the interior, has issued an order forbidding the Prussian provincial authorities to grant as hitherto a change of name to Jews. Hereafter the decision in all such cases will be reserved to the minister himself.

### LOUISIANA BILL.

#### Senate Committee Agrees to the \$5,000,000 Appropriation.

Washington, May 31.—The senate committee on appropriations agreed to Senator Cockrell's amendment to the sundry civil bill appropriating \$5,000,000 for the Louisiana purchase centennial exposition at St. Louis in 1903.

#### Rain Falls in India.

London, May 31.—The viceroy of India, Lord Curzon of Kedleston, telegraphs that good rain has fallen in Mysore and that scattered showers have fallen elsewhere. The cholera in many parts of Bombay and Rajputana has not abated and is causing much mortality and impedes the relief work. There are now 5,730,000 persons in receipt of relief.

#### King's Illness.

London, May 31.—The king of Norway and Sweden, who is intended to start for Paris Thursday, has been obliged to postpone his departure owing to a slight indisposition. It is said his illness is not serious.

#### Fought a Pistol Duel.

Chicago, May 31.—In the midst of a crowd at the railroad station at Harvey Frank Cameron and Thomas O'Neill, formerly business partners, fought a pistol duel. Cameron was mortally wounded.
