ery coal mine in the district must shut down as a consequence. The mine operators have secured the services of armed guards, and this item alone is said to be costing them at least \$1,200 per day. More than 10,000 miners are out on strike.

On November 7 it was reported from Havana that the Cuban government had handed United States Minister Squiers a proposition, which, if accepted by the United States, will result in the immediate turning of the Guantanamo station over to this country. This transaction includes the public ground and the portions purchased by the Cuban government, and if accepted the United States will have immediate control of large areas of land on both sides of the bay, inclusive of the entrance.

The great timber suit brought by the United States against Senator W. A. Clark of Montana, involving timber land in the Bitter Creek valley, in western Montana, to the value of \$2,000,000, was settled on November 7 in favor of Mr. Clark. This marks the close of the most famous timber land action ever tried in the west.

Two thousand men were laid off by the Illinois steel works at Chicago on November 7. In addition to this the 1,200 men who were discharged two weeks ago and who expected to return to work on November 9 were informed that there is no work for them.

It was reported from Constantinople on November 9 that martial law has been proclaimed in the district of Hassan Kala, province of Erzeroum, Asia Minor, and troops have been quartered in all the villages of the district in consequence of the revolutionary movements there on the part of members of the Armenian revolutionary society. One band of these Armenians was recently exterminated by the Turkish troops, and the weapons which the Kurds of the district were recently compelled to give up have been redistributed to them again.

The charges recently made against Charles H. Dietrich of Hastings, Neb., United States senator, in connection with certain transactions in postoffice appointments and rentals, are the subject of investigation by the grand jury in session at Omaha, Neb. It is believed that this investigation will require about two weeks or more. It is charged that Mr. Dietrich secured a compensation from the postmaster at Hastings for his efforts to secure his appointment and also that Senator Dietrich secured the removal of the postoffice into his own building at an exorbitant rental.

The state of Missouri had completed its claim against the United States for \$475,186.13 and on November 9 it was forwarded to Senator Cockrell for presentation to the treasury department at Washington. This claim is made for civil war expenses.

The twenty-third annual convention of the American Federation of Labor opened its sessions at Boston, on November 9 and will continue at least fourteen days. On November 9 President Samuel Gompers delivered his annual address to the delegates and various reports were read. About 450 delegates were present on the opening day. It is said that one of the principal questions to be considered by the

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convention will be whether the American Federation of Labor will recommend that its affiliated members ally themselves with that political party which in their judgment will best promote the cause of labor. It is said that a resolution will be considered pledging the federation to the cause of socialism. Among the other questions to be considered will be those of industrialism against trade autotomy, woman and child labor, the eight-hour question, trade jurisdiction, arbitration of labor difficulties and unionism in government offices.

The meeting of the National Missionary society of the Methodist Episcopal church began a seven-day session at Omaha, Neb., on November 11. The meeting was very important and was attended by all the bishops of the church except those who are in foreign lands. The sum of \$1,500,000 was apportioned to the various missionary fields and for missionary work at home and abroad.

The British are again meeting with resistance in parts of Africa. It was reported from Kenhardt, Cape Colony, on November 9 that Hottentot rebels numbering 1,500 were approaching the border and severe fighting was expected. In an engagement of British troops with an Arab tribe, near Aden, Arabia, recently, several British troopers were wounded and the tribe sustained heavy losses.

On November 10 Governor Toole of Montana called a special session of the legislature to meet on December 1 to pass laws to relieve the industrial condition in Montana caused by the shutting down of Amalgamated company's properties, whereby 15,000 men were thrown out of work and 15,000 more affected. In the meantime the works of the company are to resume

work at once in various parts of the state, and this news has caused much rejoicing throughout the state. It is said that the aim of the extra session is to pass a law whereby mining cases may be taken from one court to another when the judge in the initial court is shown to be prejudiced. Other legislation of like character has also been promised. A so-called fair trial bill of the character now proposed was passed by the last legisla-

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
