Washington.—Provost Marshal General Crowder issued an appeal to all men of Class 1, calling upon them to begin now their preparation as soldiers and not wait until they actually have been called into camp.

"Regard yourselves as a selected fraternity of active patriots," says General Crowder. "Encourage those who are weak. Inspire the indifferent. Inform the ignorant. Search out the slackers."

"It will take some time to make good soldiers out of you. The sooner you start, the sooner you will arrive."

CZECHS ATTACK CAPITAL

Army of 12,000 Operate Against City of Khabarovsk.

Vladivostok.—Of the 14,000 Czechs who reached Vladivostok, 12,000 are engaged in active military operations at Khabarovsk.

Forty thousand Czech-Slovaks hold the Trans-Siberian railroad between Samara and Irkutsk.

The immediate aim of the Czech-Slovaks is the occupation of Khabarovsk, seat of general government for Amur, in order to secure their right flank, after which they will proceed along the Chinese Eastern railway to a junction is effected with the Czech-Slovaks from Irkutsk.

The attitude of the Czechs toward the Siberian government is that of a friendly neutral, but they will oppose any threatened armed advance on Vladivostok.

Former Czar Reported Shot.

London.—The former czar of Russia was shot on July 16, according to a Russian wireless dispatch received here. The advices stated that council in control of the Ural region passed sentence on the former czar and that it was carried out on the date set.

Troops From Camp Lewis in France.

Portland, Ore.—Cable messages arriving in Portland indicate without doubt that all of the 91st Division, which left Camp Lewis late in June for overseas, has arrived safely in France.

Franco-Italians Advance in Albania.

Rome.—Franco-Italian troops again have taken up their advance in Albania, according to the Italian war office.

Plague Attacks Moscow.

London.—Cholera has broken out in Moscow, according to a Russian wireless message.
