**To Carry Exhibits Free**

I am sure the school children of Oregon will be delighted to know that the different railroads; the S. P., the O. W. R. N., and the Hill lines in Oregon, including the Astoria line, the Oregon Electric and the United Railways, have all agreed to carry the school children's exhibits to and from the State Fair this year free of charge.  
 In order to take advantage of this liberal offer the exhibits of a certain city or district must be assembled at one or more convenient shipping points and shipped together in the name of the County School Superintendent, teacher or other authorized person.  
 This is a fine thing for the railroads to do, and it will help wonderfully in this industrial contest. Now the child 200 miles away from Salem can send an exhibit to the fair just as well as one only 20 miles away. We hope the boys and girls all over the state, knowing this fact early in the season, will begin at once to prepare something for the State Fair. It begins September 29 this year, and the prize list is larger and more attractive than last year. The list will be off the press in a few days and sent out to the County School Superintendents from whom each family can secure a copy.  
 Besides the fine line of regular and special prizes in the individual classes, there are five cash prizes ranging from \$100 down to \$40 for the best collective exhibit by the schools of any county. There are also five special prizes for the best exhibit by one room districts outside of counties making a county exhibit.  
 Oregon has a good chance to lead the world in industrial work this year, and reap a great reward. To this end we hope to have the co-operation of not only all the teachers and children, but of every other citizen of the state.—N. C. Maris, Field Worker Industrial Fairs.

**Co-operative Store Fails**

Another headstone has been added to the graveyard of co-operative store failures. The Consumers Co-operative Company of Cleveland, having 270 stockholders and having been organized for the purpose of eliminating the middleman, recently filed petition in bankruptcy.  
 The majority of the stockholders had but \$10 invested in the defunct concern. The total liabilities were placed at \$4123 and the assets at \$3801. Shortly after the petition was filed there appeared in the classified columns of a Cleveland newspaper the following notice:

**ORDINANCE NO. 535**

**An Ordinance Providing the Time and Manner of Improving Fessenden Street from Oswego Street to Smith Avenue in the City of St. Johns, Oregon.**

The city of St. Johns does ordain as follows:  
 The council of the city of St. Johns, having ascertained the cost of improving Fessenden street from the westerly side line of Oswego street to the side line of Smith Avenue in the city of St. Johns, as shown by resolution of the council of said city, dated on the 4th day of March, 1913, and recorded in the office of the recorder of said city, and notice thereof having been published in the St. Johns Review, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, on the 7th and 14th days of March, 1913, as shown by the affidavit of the foreman of said paper, which said affidavit is on file in the office of the city recorder; and legal posting of notices of such improvement, as shown by the affidavit of the city engineer on file in the office of the city recorder; and no remonstrances having been filed, and, as provided by said resolution, the engineer's preliminary estimate of cost of said improvement is \$10,659.45, but shall be more accurately determined by said engineer.  
 Now, therefore, it is hereby ordered that said street be improved and the time for the completion of said improvement is hereby fixed at 60 days from last publication of notice of proposals of said work, which said proposals must be filed with the recorder of said city on or before the 15th day of April, 1913, at 8 o'clock, p. m. of said day.  
 That said street shall be improved as follows: By grading same to the established subgrade and by laying a standard concrete pavement six inches thick and sixteen feet wide on each side and abutting the curb as now laid, together with all necessary concrete crossings and tile drains.  
 The city recorder shall give notice by publication for not less than three insertions in the St. Johns Review, the official newspaper, inviting proposals for making said improvement.  
 Said improvement shall in all respects be done and completed in conformity with the provisions of Ordinance No. 463, except as otherwise provided in this ordinance; all work to be done under the direction and supervision of the city engineer.  
 That the cost of said improvement shall be assessed against the property in the local improvement district as described in said resolution and designated as District No. 96.  
 Passed by the council this 25th day of March, 1913.
