Thompson, the new arrangement was made after consultation with the mill hands and operation will continue as long as possible, although the company would lose less by closing down. There never has been a shut down at the Portland Woolen Mills company's plant in its eighteen years of existence and it has developed into a plant of 141 looms, the largest mill west of Ohio.


