NOTICE TO KILL WEEDS.
All parties owning or occupying any land in Lincoln township, Lincoln county, South Dakota, upon which any weeds, known as Russian thistle, Canada thistle or Cockle Burr are now growing, are hereby ordered to destroy the same either by plowing them under, mowing and burning them or by some other means preventing them from producing seed. A recent act of the state legislature requires this to be done during the month of July and it is the duty of the overseers of highways to destroy all such weeds of the kind mentioned, as may be found undestroyed on August 1, 1890, and assess the cost against the property.
