THE NEWS AROUND HOME.

E. E. Griswold was in town Friday and said that the man Dan Osgood, who skipped out from Highland township so mysteriously on the third of last July, is still at Mt. Vernon, S. D. He says that Osgood has written letters to parties in this locality that would indicate that he is either crazy or pretends to be in that condition.

A severe hail and wind storm visited the city of Sioux Falls early last Sunday morning and planted its foot-steps of destruction quite deeply upon the Queen City. Fruit, vegetables and window-lights suffered the greatest damage and while the losses in the city are estimated to be over ten thousand dollars, the farmers in the surrounding country were not visited by the storm and their excellent crops escaped entirely unharmed.

Mr. S. S. Dunn, a gentleman from Centerville, has secured control of the tow mill of L. C. Paxton, at this place and will operate the same during the coming season. Mr. Dunn advertises for flax straw in this issue of this paper and he says he expects to commence business immediately. The fact that he will pay a fair price for the straw is good news to the farmers of this locality. Mr. Dunn has been in all the various branches of the tow business for twenty-five years.

Next week the FARMERS' ADVOCATE will begin the publication of a regular market report from all the grain and stock markets in the county; also a weekly review of the condition of trade in the larger trade centers of the country. Great care will be taken to make the report as correct and reliable as is possible for a newspaper to do, and it is desired to make this feature of the paper of special interest to the farmers and stock raisers of this locality. The paper will also add several other important improvements of much interest and benefit to the farmers of South Dakota, soon.

Miss Dell Noble, of Mitchell, preceptress of Dakota University, the Methodist college at that place, spoke at the M. E. church in this city last Sunday evening. Miss Noble spoke on the subject of the Soul's Coronation and was greeted by a large audience, and at the close of her lecture she spoke a few moments on the advantages of Dakota University for the education of young people, indicating pretty clearly that the institution she represents is deserving of patronage and a credit to the Methodist church of the state. Miss Noble has left a good impression among the people of Canton, both as to herself and Dakota University.

The heaviest crop of oats ever raised in this county has just been harvested upon the farm of Mike Harris, over in Highland township. The crop consisted of ten acres and the growth was so intensely prolific that it took forty pounds of binding twine to bind it—four pounds per acre. The highest quantity of twine ever heard of being required to bind an acre of oats before was two and a half pounds. The report seems almost incredible, but our informant speaks upon the best authority and says he is positive that there was no mistake made in the weight of twine or the exact amount used.

A number of prominent citizens of Lincoln township, who are deeply interested in the election of a good man for that office, present the name of Henry Barnum, a foremost citizen of that township, as a candidate for sheriff and announce that they will present his name in the forthcoming independent convention. In justice to Mr. Barnum, it must be stated that he is a man of excellent qualifications for the office and the independent convention will make no mistake in the nomination for a sheriff, if the choice falls to Mr. Barnum. He is not only capable and honest, but very popular at home and he would make a strong candidate.

In its last issue the FARMERS' ADVOCATE announced the fact that at a recent meeting of the stockholders of the company, steps were taken to change the name of the paper and that the proposed change would take place this week. On further investigation, however, it was discovered that the change could not be legally made until certain portions of the state laws governing corporations, had been gone through. The directors have taken steps to comply with the law in

every particular, and it is hoped that the matter will not need to be deferred long, though just what amount of time will be required is not definitely known. There is always an unknown amount of ginger-bread connected with such things and until that is disposed of, the readers of this paper will have to be contented with the old name. The obstructions yet in the way were not discovered until after the last issue, nor until after the change had been ordered at the house furnishing the patent side of the paper; consequently that side and the home side, appear to be on very bad terms this week.
