Next week THE LEADER will resume the publication of the Public Question Bureau which has been neglected during the late political campaign.

A call for a meeting of workingmen to be held at the court house Saturday evening Nov. 22, appears in another part of this issue. The object is to organize an assembly of the Knights of Labor in Canton.

Simmons, and sincerely hopes that his work here will be a source of much pleasure and profit to him as well as his excellent congregation.

Win. Donoho has moved his family from Beloit to Canton having rented the former residence of Dr. O'Neil. Will make his permanent home in Canton. His principle object in doing this is to enable him to give closer attention to the flour and feed store of the Beloit Mills in which Mr. Donoho has an interest. This enterprise has become the leading establishment of the kind in Canton and under Mr. Donoho's personal supervision it will doubtless prosper more than ever. THE LEADER welcomes him and his good family to Canton and to South Dakota.

Number 2, volume six of the Journal of Mycology issued by the Division of Vegetable Pathology, United States Department of Agriculture, is now being distributed. Florists will find the publication of special interest, as it contains a full account of a new hollyhock disease and of successful experiments in its treatment. The disease appeared in several New York houses a few years ago and has proved a very serious pest, the loss this season in one establishment being over \$1,000. The knapsack sprayer mentioned in a previous number is described and illustrated. This machine has been found as effective as any of the more expensive pumps, and not being patented can be made at small expense. Other papers in the Journal discuss recent investigations concerning the smut fungi; a new and destructive disease of oats; copper soda and coppergypsum as remedies for grape mildew; etc. For the benefit of those who are specially interested a reprint of the article on the hollyhock disease has been issued for special distribution, and may be obtained by applying to the secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., or to the chief of the division of Vegetable Pathology.

A book to buy. Webster's International dictionary. This new book is the authentic "Unabridged" thoroughly revised and enlarged under the supervision of Noah Porter, D. D., LL. D., of Yale University. Editorial work on the revision has been in active progress for over ten years and more than a hundred paid literary workers have been engaged upon it. The sum expended in its preparation before the first copy was printed exceeded \$300,000. This work, will be of more value to the members the roof than many times its cost laid up in money.

Asa Forrest, Sr. will go on record as making the best guess on the result of the election of Lincoln county. On the last day of Oct., on his return from Sioux City, five days before the election, Mr. Forrest made the following memorandum on a slip of paper, in the presence of witnesses and planted it down into the bottom of his over coat pocket: "If the weather is fair the total vote of Lincoln county will be 2035. Of these Pierre will get 985, and Huron 1050." The vote of the county was 2077. Pierre got 951 and Huron 1077 for capital, some ballots not voting for capital.

The agricultural experiment stations of the country, over fifty in number, issue annually some three hundred bulletins and reports of from four to two hundred and fifty pages each. Very few people have access to all of these publications, and fewer still can afford the time required to note the character and results of the experiments they describe. Those who find it desirable to keep pace with the progress of agricultural experimentation will find a condensed record of all station work in the Experiment Station Record, issued by the United States department of Agriculture. The October number is being distributed, and the November number also is practically ready.

The Adelpic Literary society of Augustana College is becoming an object of much interest among the students of the college and the citizens of the town. The society holds regular meetings on Friday evenings of each week for literary exercises and discussions upon such questions as may come up from time to time. The subject of debate last Friday evening was "Resolved that the republican party is preferable to the independent. The debate was carried on by four of the students and decided in favor of the negative. The subject for debate this Friday evening is the question "Resolved that the use of tobacco leads to the use of intoxicating drink". The members of the society are always pleased to welcome outsiders to visit the sessions of the society.
