The following is the state of the produce market at Canton, Thursday morning, January 29: Wheat, 70 to 75c; oats, 35 to 36c; corn, 35c; barley, 40 to 50c; flax, 97c; hogs, \$6.00; cattle, fat steers, 3 to 3 1/2c; butchers' stock, \$1.75 to \$2.25. Hogs have come down 10 cents.

A bill has been introduced in the Illinois legislature the provisions of which make it a crime punishable by a fine of \$600, for an employe to leave the service of any person or corporation without giving at least two weeks notice, and also a fine of the same amount for an employer to discharge an employe without two weeks notice. The bill provides further for a board of arbitration to settle difficulties between employer and employe, and is intended to prevent strikes, lockouts, etc.

and the salary of the clerk or deputy of the register of deeds at \$35.00 per month and each office was allowed a clerk during such time as may be deemed necessary.

The paupers of the county were granted aid for the ensuing quarter as follows:

On motion Dr. Rosenbaum was appointed county physician for the ensuing year.

On motion Dr. Lewis and M. E. Rudolph were appointed physician and attorney, respectively, on the board of insanity for the ensuing year.

For the purpose of securing a uniform assessment throughout the county the following instructions were issued to assessors for 1891: Work horses three years old or over shall be assessed so as to average \$40. Colts over 2 years old and under 3 years old shall be assessed so as to average \$20. Colts over one and under two years old so as to average \$10. Mules so as to average \$40. Jacks so as to average \$100. Jennets so as to average \$50. Stallion (for service) so as to average \$200. Thoroughbred stallions so as to average \$500. Ponies so as to average \$10. Work cattle so as to average \$30 per pair. Cows so as to average \$5. Cattle over one and under 2 years old so as to average \$4. Cattle over 2 and under 3 so as to average \$5. All other cattle so as to average \$10. Sheep over 3 months old so as to average 75c. Swine three months old so as to average \$1.50. Carriages and vehicles shall be assessed at what they are worth. Machinery and all other property not mentioned herein and not by the law exempt from taxation shall be assessed at what they are worth whether paid for or not.

Improvements on government land (except breaking) at its cash value. All-decided lands in the county that has been proved upon (except timber land) shall be assessed as follows: Land in Canton township and in township 100, range 50 of Springdale and Delapre townships at 7.50 per acre, lands in Eden, Norway,

Brooklyn, Highland and Perry townships at \$9.75 per acre; lands in Delaware, Lynn, Dayton, and LaValley townships at \$6.50 per acre, lands in Lincoln and Grant townships at \$6.25 per acre, all lands in township 100, range 51, of Delapre and 100-49 of Springdale at \$5.75 per acre, land in Fairview township at \$5.00 per acre and improvements to be added. Lots in the city of Canton or any addition thereto to be assessed at from \$10 to \$4000; lots in Eden at from \$5.00 to \$800; in Worthing at from \$3.00 to \$900; lots in Lennox at from \$5.00 to \$800; lots in Harker and Greens addition to Beresford at from \$3.00 to \$300. On motion the salary of states att'y was fixed at \$780 per annum.

On motion the following bills were allowed:

G. L. Hubbard, cash advanced, \$5.70; J. M. North, for sand furnished and draying, \$2.75; H. N. Cooper, cash advanced, \$7.90; H. N. Cooper, salary as county auditor and cash paid for office work, \$486.86; Henry Kndert, per diem, \$46.90; W. H. Miller, per diem, \$24.20; W. B. Wait, per diem, \$45.50.

On motion the board then adjourned to meet again on Monday, March 2nd., 1891.

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
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
