The committee recommended that the delegates present from any township cast the full vote of the township. The report of the committee on credentials was adopted and on motion Ole Rommereim was allowed a seat in the con-

vention instead of one of the absent delegates from Norway township.

On motion the chair appointed Henry Barnum as teller. Whereupon the convention proceeded to an informal ballot with the following result: Whole number of votes cast 14, of which C. A. Carlson received 9 votes and P. J. Lukken 5 votes.

On motion, a formal ballot was taken which showed the whole number of votes cast to be 22 of which C. A. Carlson received 14 and P. J. Lukken 8.

On motion C. A. Carlson was made the unanimous choice of the convention for county commissioner and on motion the convention adjourned.
