### County Commissioners Proceedings.

REGULAR SESSION JAN. 3, 1893.

The board of county commissioners of Lincoln county met at the auditor's office in the city of Canton, on Tuesday the 3rd day of January A. D. 1893, pursuant to statute and published notice.

Monday being a legal holiday the board convened Tuesday as stated.

Present commissioners Miller and Carlson. Commissioner elect W. B. Wait appeared and qualified by taking the oath of office as prescribed by law, and took his seat as a member of the county board.

The board proceeded to the election of one of their number as chairman for the ensuing year.

On motion W. H. Miller, Jr. was elected chairman.

The following resolution was passed: Resolved that the amount of the official bonds of the several county officers for the ensuing term be fixed as follows.

Upon motion the salary of the state's attorney for the ensuing term was made seven hundred dollars per annum as fixed in January 1891.

An inventory of the books and records of the office of coroner was taken and the official bond of F. W. Rosenbaum, coroner, with O. A. Rudolph and A. Repp as sureties, was on motion approved.

An inventory was taken of books and records of the sheriff's office after which the official bond of R. A. Pierce with Thos. Fisher, J. C. Brown, Wm. Kundert, Geo. Schatzell as sureties, was on motion approved.

An inventory was taken of the books and records in the office of county superintendent and the official bond of H. B. Lund, county Supt., with Geo. Olson and Ole Thompson, as sureties, was on motion approved.

An inventory of the books and records belonging to the office of the clerk of the courts was taken, found correct and the official bond of H. H. DeLong with A. R. Brown and O. A. Rudolph as sureties, was on motion approved.

On motion the following appointments were made for the ensuing year.

A. R. Brown, attorney on insanity board (vice M. E. Rudolph resigned) for two years.
