E. E. Carpenter, Auditor of the Gulf and Inter-State railway company, arrived in Canton direct from Galveston Monday. Mr. Carpenter, as well as the Kansas and Texas papers, are confident of the success of this grand undertaking. The ocean connection of the road is already located at Port Bolivar on the ocean side of Galveston Bay, and a half interest in 2800 acres of land has been given the company. The city of Galveston has agreed to give the new road \$500,000 in cash when 50 miles are completed north from that city. 


