THANKS TO THE FIRE BOYS.

Citizens of the "Hub" Denote their
 Appreciation of Assistance by
 Sister Towns.

The citizens of Worthing, S. D., were
 called together April 29, 1898, for the
 purpose of passing resolutions and a
 vote of thanks to our neighboring fel-
 low citizens for their help during the
 fire April 28, 1898.

Fred Gerber was chosen chairman,
 and J. S. Hatlestad secretary. On mo-
 tion H. Bradshaw, J. S. Hatlestad and
 Ed. D. Lewis were appointed a com-
 mittee on resolutions. The committee
 made the following report, which was
 adopted:

"Resolved, That the thanks of the
 citizens of Worthing be most heartily
 and sincerely extended to the fire com-
 panies of Lennox, Sioux Falls and Can-
 ton, for their faithful service when
 called upon to assist their neighboring
 village in a time when the fire demon
 threatened to reduce our homes and
 property to ashes. And in recognition
 of the speed made by the firemen and
 citizens, Lennox making the distance
 of nine miles with a 2,000-pound engine,
 in forty minutes; Sioux Falls company
 making seventeen miles with a 3,000
 pound engine in one hour and fifty-five
 minutes, in their heroic efforts to ren-
 der aid to their sister town, we, the
 citizens of Worthing, again thank you
 one and all for your splendid work and
 for the good will manifested toward us
 at a time when we needed friends more
 than ever before. Let us assure you
 that all Worthingites are much more
 thankful than your committee is able
 to describe, and should any of you at
 any time need our services, we shall be
 pleased to return our united strength
 in any way we can to return in a slight
 measure the good service done us on
 April 28, 1898.

Last week Judge Kennedy tried an
 important case at Rock Rapids, Iowa,
 before Judge Wakefield. For a number
 of years it appears that M. E. Rudolph,
 in the name of his wife, had been loan-
 ing money to Milt Beck, east of Beloit,
 and took security on the farm of Milt
 Beck's father and mother aged respect-
 ively 78 and 80 years. On the 30th day
 of March, 1898, Mr. Rudolph went over
 to the residence of the old folks on the
 farm and under the representation that
 he wanted them to sign a paper which
 would make them safe in their farm,
 and it appears he got them to sign a
 warranty deed to him. Afterwards
 Rudolph rented the farm to one H.
 Patterson and tried to deprive the old
 folks of all rights to the place. The
 old folks vigorously denied that they
 ever made a deed and contended that
 they never were informed that the paper
 they signed was a deed and did not
 know it until Mr. Rudolph in 1897
 tried to oust them. They employed
 Judge Kennedy to protect them. He
 brought an action to vacate the deed
 and after a closely contested trial he
 succeeded in declaring the deed a trust
 and the right of the old folks to redeem,
 thus saving them their fine farm on
 which they have lived for the past 17
 years.

To all opposed to the Republican party
 in Lincoln county:

A number of inquiries have been
 addressed to me as to why it is that
 the People's party central committees
 have invited all opposed to the Republi-
 can party to participate in the Peo-
 ple's party caucuses and conventions
 when both Democrats and Free Silver
 Republicans have called conventions of
 their own. Shall these parties not only
 hold conventions of their own but also
 participate in the People's party con-
 ventions?

In reply to all such inquiries I will
 say that it is the general and united
 sentiment of all parties who believe in
 clean government in this state and who
 believe in the control of trusts and
 corporations and the successful enforce-
 ment of the railroad law, that the Rep-
 ublican party should be prevented
 from returning to power and the con-
 trol of the state government; that the
 election this year is also a congressional
 election; that we are now involved in
 war and similar conditions exist so far
 as monetary matters are concerned as
 existed in 1861-5, and the money inter-
 ests are active in their endeavors and
 determination to again inflict on the
 nation another burden of interest bear-
 ing bonds and to enact such legislation
 during the war excitement as will en-
 able them to exact tribute from the
 producer and laborer for the next
 generation. In order to defeat this at-
 tack of the money power on the welfare
 and liberties of the people, it is vitally
 necessary that the control of the lower
 house of congress should be wrested
 from them at the coming election. In
 order to do this it is necessary that
 every true patriot should unite in op-
 position to the Republican party and elect
 men opposed to its policy.

To this end it has been deemed wise
 by the People's party committees of the
 state to open their caucuses and con-
 ventions to all who will unite with
 them to save both state and nation.
 The only qualification for admission is
 the fact of honest opposition to the gold
 standard plutocratic Republicanism.
 If such unity is accomplished then suc-
 cess is certain. It is not the purpose
 of the People's party to have three
 tickets in the field with the same candi-
 dates on each ticket representing the
 People's party, the Democratic party
 and the Free Silver Republican party.
 It is the purpose of the People's party
 to have but one ticket in the field and
 on that ticket men will be placed on
 account of their fitness and earnestness
 in opposing the ruinous policies of the
 Republican party. Bryan Democrats
 and Free Silver Republicans having
 united with us for a common success it
 is only just and proper that they should
 be fairly dealt with in the rewards of
 success and in representation on the
 ticket and in the offices.

The Republicans are very anxious
 that the opposition to them should put
 three tickets in the field so as to show
 that office is more vital to them than
 principle and also to enable the Republi-
 cans to work the one party against
 the other and to produce rivalries and
 jealousies and strife; but all reformers
 are too wise to adopt such tactics on
 the part of the Republicans. Wisdom
 dictates that there should be no divi-
 sions, rivalries or strife; that perfect
 unity for this campaign should be ac-
 complished and the only way to do that
 is for all to unite with the People's
 party and on its alignment, ticket and
 campaign face a united opposition.

The object of the Democrats in call-
 ing a state convention is by their state
 organization to assist in commending
 such a union as is herein outlined. The
 Free Silver Republicans would have
 been wiser in my opinion not to have
 made an attempt at organization in this
 state election, but a general consulta-
 tion of all elements at Aberdeen will be
 conducive of harmony and unity.

I therefore, on behalf of the commit-
 tee, urge all reformers, regardless of
 party affiliations, to go into the People's
 party caucuses in this county and come
 up to our convention at Worthing with
 full assurance that they will one and
 all be fairly dealt with by that conven-
 tion.
