COMMITTED TO GOLD.

"We are uncompromisingly in favor
 of the maintenance of the single gold
 standard."
 Thus said the national Republican
 league at its Omaha gathering on the
 14th of last month.

The Republican party has gotten
 through with any semblance of a
 straddle on the money question. It
 is notable that particularly in the
 northwest, where the silver advoc-
 ates were supposed to thrive, the
 conventions are all declaring un-
 equivocally for the gold standard.
 The nation has made its greatest
 strides under that standard. The
 present return flood of prosperity
 has come under that standard. It
 is a pretty good standard.

Thus said the state organ of the Re-
 publican party, the Sioux Falls Argus-
 Leader, in its issue of August 17th.
 Both national and state Republicanism
 are finally committed to gold monometal-
 lism—openly committed. The sneak
 of 1896 has ended, the ambush under
 which the McKinley campaign was
 waged is abandoned. During that cam-
 paign it was the prophesy of the bimetal-
 lic organization that with success at
 the polls the Republican party would
 declare for the single gold standard and
 admit that the St. Louis promise of in-
 ternational bimetalism was fraudulently
 conceived and deceitfully imposed
 for the mere purpose of catching the
 votes of those Republicans whose party
 teachings had committed them to bi-
 metallism.

The first step towards the fulfill-
 ment of that prophesy was taken on in-
 auguration day, when Mr. McKinley an-
 nounced the appointment of Mr. Gage,
 a Cleveland gold standard Democrat,
 as his secretary of the treasury. From
 that event down to the present trend
 of Republicanism has been into the
 camp of Wall and Lombard streets,
 where the financial policies of four
 great nations are arranged and formu-
 lated. Beginning with St. Louis, where
 Wall street dictated the money plank,
 down through Mr. McKinley's dreary
 campaign reiteration about "national
 honor," the "best money in the world,"
 "sound dollars," "round dollars,"
 through the manufacturers' fifteen dol-
 lars a plate banquet in New York last
 January, where our Republican presi-
 dent enunciated his monometallic
 scheme—to the Omaha league gather-
 ing and the subsequent complete con-
 version of Republican newspapers—the
 Republican party has maneuvered its
 forces toward the position it now occu-
 pies behind the entrenchments of ab-
 solute monometallism of the golden spe-
 cies.

When the Argus-Leader states that
 the conventions of the northwest are
 declaring unanimously for monometal-
 lism, it means the Republican conven-
 tions. None others have fallen into the
 clutches of the money power. These
 conventions are merely obeying the in-
 structions of the multi-millionaire labor
 oppressor who is chairman of their na-
 tional organization. With one breath
 he orders the elevation of the gold
 standard, with the next he declares that
 the money question is dead—that it has
 been divorced from politics. The pup-
 pets of the states under his control take
 up the new party shibboleth—"the silver
 issue is dead, up with the gold dollar."
 The mask is off and the grinning goblin
 of the yellow conspiracy presides over
 the destinies of a party once great in
 its fealty to mankind, in its champion-
 ship of the weak and oppressed—now
 fallen into abject servitude to mammon
 and its gilded votaries.

There are many within reach of the
 Press and Dakotan who, from love of
 old associations, from reverence of its
 past glorious achievements, have fol-
 lowed the Republican party over its
 devious course, hoping, believing it
 would retrieve the errors of the fanatis-
 ms within it—that it would retrace
 its steps to the solid ground of utilitar-
 ianism, and once more become the ad-
 vocate and defender of the rights of the
 people. Their disappointment comes in
 the golden edict proclaimed from the
 battlements of party strongholds. Their
 dream of reparation is ended. They
 must now choose between the people
 and those who conspire to become the
 masters of the people.—Yankton Press
 and Dakotan.
