#### FROM GENERAL WEAVER.

Colfax, Ia., Nov. 21.—To the Editor of the World-Herald: I have read the address of Mr. Washburn of Boston, treasurer of the People's party committee, which appeared in the Chicago Chronicle of the 20th inst., calling for the organization of a new political party. Mr. Washburn is a sincere reformer and means well. But his Boston cry for reorganization has its exact counterpart in the recent cry for the reorganization of the Democratic party, which came up from Wall street. Though from opposite poles both are pleas for disorganization and if listened to will, in either case, produce exactly that result. Mr. Washburn thinks that "to hold what we have and maintain our present momentum a new party must be formed as the quickest road to ultimate success." He wishes Mr. Bryan to take the leadership of this new party. Under the leadership of Mr. Bryan and in the hands of its absolutely loyal committee, the Democratic party is a reform party—a new and mighty reform force—and its leadership cannot revert to objectionable hands unless the 7,000,000 reform voters commit the stupendous blunder of disbanding in the face of the enemy for the vain purpose of attempting a reorganization.

The way to insure complete union of the reform forces is for the elements which rallied to the support of Mr. Bryan to stay together. The work of the unification is already accomplished and our leader is the best known and best beloved man on earth today. A new organization could not muster one half of the mighty host who gave us their support in 1900, and plutocracy would had the advent of a new party with peace of joy. It would insure their supremacy for a quarter of a century. If the various reform elements that supported our leader in the memorable conflict of the present year desire to exert salutary influence in political circles in the future let them resolutely stand by their guns and await events. Bryan and a thousand sleepless sentinels are on the watch towers. Let us listen to their bugle calls and be ready for duty. It is folly to talk off any other course. Let every patriot stand by the new democracy, count himself as a part of it and hold up the hands of our gallant and beloved leader.

Mr. Washburn's proposition is simply this: To hold what we have already secured we must let go of it. To maintain our present momentum we must stop short and deflect to the brush. Remember the folly of the fabled canine that let go of the substance and jumped after the shadow.

Senator C. K. Davis of Minnesota, died at his home in St. Paul Tuesday night at 9 o'clock, after an illness of two months. Senator Davis was chairman of the committee of foreign relations of the senate and was a most distinguished personage. He had been in continual public service for thirty-three years. When John Sherman retired from the United States senate at the beginning of McKinley's administration, Mr. Davis succeeded him as chairman of the committee on foreign relations. Senator Davis was noted in the senate as an authority on international law and as a linguist of almost unequalled ability. He was a great student of the ancient classics and of modern languages. Few college professors could read Greek with so much facility as he and few of them were so well acquainted with the idioms of the Latin language. His knowledge of modern languages was so accurate that he was called upon frequently by the state department to determine the exact meaning of diplomatic correspondence with foreign nations.
