
Reliance Gang, the Prize Winner.




Bower City Cultivator.







For County Superintendent.

The Hudson Tribune announces that Prof. George Dean, principal of the Lennox schools, is a candidate for County superintendent of schools, and states that it will cheerfully support him for the position. The General Law Wins.

The special election called for Tuesday, March 18, to vote upon the proposition of surrendering the old charter and reincorporating under the general law, was a very quiet affair, considering the amount of discussion as to the merits or demerits of the general law. The total vote cast was 313, of which 234 favored the general law and 79 were in opposition. Now let the council divide the city into wards, and let us get into our general law pants quick. The general opinion seems to favor a division on Main and 5th streets and it looks as if no fairer division could be made.

We knew him well and enjoyed many a pleasant hour with him when he commanded the District of Dakota, with headquarters at Fort Sully. He and Pap Thomas were bosom friends and it was through his efforts that Thomas was promoted to Brigadier in the regular army at the close of the war.

Gov. Herried has appointed Attorney Burt of Huron Attorney General. Judge Burt is an able lawyer and was formerly a law partner of W. B. Sterling.

W. J. Wimer seems to be in the lead for mayor, and he seems to have the good fortune to get what he goes after. The mayor's office under the new law will be no summer dream, and it will require firmness and decision, qualities possessed by Canton's famous home builder.

Hon. George W. Kingsbury, editor of the Press & Dakotan, and one of the most genial gentlemen in the state, arrived in Yankton, March 17, 1893, forty years ago. He has been in the newspaper harness almost continuously, with the exception of a year or two when he sold the old Union & Dakotan to McIntyre of Foster in '89. Mr. Kingsbury is one of the most thoroughly equipped newspaper men in the northwest, a clean cut and forceful writer, an independent thinker, broad-minded, liberal and fair, a hundred times above the standard of most of the men who claim to be moulders of public opinion in this state. He is of the old school of newspaper men, who are known and admired for their dignified bearing and courteous treatment of all. We heard Mr. Kingsbury sing the "Old Oaken Bucket," over thirty years ago, and we have never heard anyone sing it so sweetly since.
