Word has been received at this place that James Kean who about a month ago went to his ranch in Fairview expecting to be gone but ten or twelve days, was dead, the result being a very severe case of black smallpox. The case was so severe that the physicians gave up all hope from the start. It is understood he suffered terribly during his sickness. It is thought that he contracted the disease by sleeping in a bed at a neighbor's house near the ranch which had previously been occupied by a young lady who had just recovered from an attack of the dread disease. His wife and little son went to Fairview and went under quarantine in order to be with the sick man.

Mr. Kean came to Mitchell to reside only about two years ago and purchased the Porterfield nursery place a short distance southwest from town. He was a man in comparatively circumstances, owning a ranch in Sanborn county in addition to the one in Fairview. He also possessed a large tract of land in Hutchinson county.

Bro. Kean will be well enough in a week to give that fellow a good licking and he deserves it. Dr. Rogers of Canton, has had Mr. Kean in charge and brought him through a pretty stiff case of small pox with no expectation that the services of an undertaker would be needed for years to come.
