Learned scientists believe the bottom of the Caribbean sea is dropping into the moulton mass underneath, and water is sinking through the cracks which in turn produces the enormous volcanic forces that are belching forth in unlooked for places. One big upheaval would sink the narrow Andes belt between the two seas and thus bring additional proof of a lost Atlantis. The earth's crust is very thin in places and the hot regions not far off.

Elk Point Leader.—Col. Linn comes out in his last week's LEADER stating that Canton wants the next republican state convention. He says that city can take care of 5,000 people. We will remind the Colonel that at the next state republican convention there will be several thousand candidates for the various offices to be filled, besides the candidates themselves and their boosters. Therefore the Colonel is a little off on the crowd that he says he can take care of. We are under the impression that it is another moon he is after and would not be surprised but that he has a card up his sleeve with a picture of Tom Thorsen on one side and a candidate for governor of South Dakota on the other.

The Britt, Iowa, Tribune man has a corn shredder and here is what he has found out by experience: "Corn shredders this year have a new wrinkle. The corn first goes through a clothes wringer, then the shredder takes it and a tank at the side catches the juice after the milk has been knocked out of the kernels. Let this stand twenty-four hours in a cool place, skim it then add the rennet and press it into a cheese. The whey is then distilled and makes an article of whiskey that three swallows of it will make a man pick his own pocket and trade his grandmothers tombstone for bottles to keep it in. The cobs can be used in upholstery and the shredded fodder makes animal sausage. It wasn't the frost that hurt corn it was just the lack of about three weeks of decent corn weather at both ends of the season. Just set the shredder a little tighter and it will give much and milk already mixed."

The capital removal question is being discussed generally by the press of the state and the sentiment seems to be strong for removal. Of course Pierre combats this sentiment and purpose with all her ability and will make a desperate effort to block the removal scheme. From present indications the scheme for removal will carry if the adherents of Mitchell, Redfield and Huron stand united and carry out their program regardless of location. Pierre hopes that something may turn up to disorganize the combine and render their efforts fruitless, and thinks that the location at any one of the three points named may result in a final defeat of the measure through jealousy and defeat. It is generally believed that Pierre will be disappointed in this hope, because the removalists have agreed to abide the result of the location and stand solid for removal under any circumstances. Should this prove true Pierre will put up a fight in which she will meet defeat.

Our farmer readers will have observed that we have devoted a good deal of space in the LEADER of late to the importance of securing and planting good seed corn and we shall continue to discuss this question as far as possible all winter, because our farmers derive a good share of their wealth from corn, and good corn represents fat steers and hogs and they represent a fat bank account. Therefore we desire to impress upon our farmers the importance of good seed, of an early variety, and seed that is adapted to this latitude or climate. There is not a large amount of good seed in this part of the country now, although many of our farmers have corn that will be considered good seed next spring. It remains for our farmers to determine this question before spring and the LEADER hopes no man will neglect to protect himself against poor seed, and make the necessary tests before it is too late. The late corn and early frosts of this year could not be provided against. The great wind storm of June 25 delayed the natural growth of corn nearly three weeks, and the cold backward summer was unfavorable. Such conditions may not occur again in a generation. Get good seed of an early variety and plant early and keep the weeds down and Lincoln county will raise a crop of corn that will be satisfactory to all.

Governor Herried's Thanksgiving proclamation was a little late in getting around this year, but he is excusable under the circumstances. When a candidate for governor carries every county in his state giving a majority of 25,000, he has reason to be proud and full of thanksgiving, especially in a state that four years ago elected a fusion governor. It is a remarkable change and one that indicates that nearly all the free silver—populist—republicans have returned to their former political allegiance. Governor Herried has indeed reason to feel a just pride in the result of the election, and his heart sings in unison with the popular tribute sung in honor of the pilgrims, which we reproduce:

"Oh God, beneath Thy guiding hand,
Our exiled fathers crossed the sea;
And when they trod the wintry strand,
With prayer and palm they worshipped Thee.
Thou heard'st, well pleased, the song,
The prayer:
Thy blessing came; and still is power
Shall onward, through all ages, bear
The memory of that holy hour.
Laws, freedom, truth, and faith in God
Came with those exiles o'er the waves;
And where their pilgrim feet have trod,
The God they trusted guards their graves.
And here Thy Name, O God of love,
Their children's children shall adore,
Till these eternal hills remove,
And spring adorns the earth no more."
