Geo. Henderson telephoned to the
LEADER Tuesday morning: "We have
given Canton a river again, and raised
thetwater about three feet." This
means that Messrs. Henderson & John-
son have raised the water in their mill
dam three feet more than they actually
need for grinding power. The people
of Canton don't seem to realize that the
dam at Beloit is a private affair, and
that the owners are not in duty bound
to carry a big head of water to supply
Canton with a beautiful body of water
fit for all the summer amusements one
could wish for in that line. When the
river is down the pumps at the city
water works pump lots of air and still
the city has never showed any disposi-
tion to help maintain a sufficient vol-
ume of water for the benefit of the city
or the people thereof. Without a dam
at Beloit Canton would have neither
boating, fishing or swimming, and the
pleasures of the beautiful river given us
by the Henderson and Johnson dam
would dwindle into a measly little
rivulet hardly strong enough to carry
away the sewerage. In raising the
water in the dam to the limit, makes
damage to the dam almost certain if a
cloudburst or unusually heavy rain
should come. Of course Messrs. Hen-
derson & Johnson are disposed to do
everything within reason to assist Can-
ton and aid her in the enjoyment of all
the natural advantages of a beautiful
ten mile reach of river, still it looks to
the LEADER that Canton cannot expect
to have others protect her all the time
in the enjoyment of river privileges in
summer and ice advantages in winter,
and do nothing in return. Dr. Noid
said Monday to the LEADER that he
was willing to contribute \$5 a year to-
wards maintaining and protecting the
Beloit dam, and there is no doubt many
more who would gladly contribute in
this direction. Is a good flow of water
in the city wells worth anything? Is a
good ice harvest desirable? There are
many other things that might be con-
sidered, but we have mentioned enough
to set the people of Canton to thinking.
Canton is not obliged to furnish Hen-
derson & Johnson with a dam, neither is
Henderson & Johnson obliged to fur-
nish Canton with a river. Henderson
& Johnson are asking nothing from
Canton, but Canton needs the help of
Henderson & Johnson. Is Canton will-
ing to do a plain duty in the premises?
The city council represent the people.
