

THEODORE ROOSEVELT.

The Elk Point Leader wants saloons It says that the city treasury will miss the \$1,800 license money if the saloon is voted out. The city gets \$1,800 license money and the county gets \$1,200 out of three saloons, and it costs the people who support the saloons about 24,000 a year, and this money comes out of the people who are not, as a rule, able to spend their money for whisky and beer for misery and suffering and hell breeding conditions. Still some people will tell you there is money in the saloon—there is—yes, for the brewer and the lawyers.

Fulton Advocate: If the editor of the Advocate believed, as the Pierre papers in the eastern part of the state profess to believe, that the western half of the state is as good a natural agricultural section as the east half, he would not only advise all his readers to sell their holdings in the east half and get west of the Missouri as soon as possible, but he would lead the procession. If that is as good an agricultural section as this we are all ninnyes for holding on to land at \$20 to \$50 an acre when by going only 100 miles west we can get just as good land for \$3 to \$5 an acre. Strike one of these men who are always telling of the agricultural advantages of the west half of the state, and offer to trade him land west of Pierre for land east of the Jim, five acres to one, and he will laugh in your face. This is a good illustration of the actual fact he has in the agricultural possibilities of that section.

Waubay Clipper: Although we have nothing to say against land west of the Missouri still there is considerable to say against leaving the capital in a city that has no future, that can never become a place worthy of more than a branch railroad, and which is not accessible as even our own little city of Waubay.

MODEL OF PREHISTORIC REPTILE.

Armored Lizard that Thrived in Wyoming Nine Million Years Ago to be Seen at World's Fair.

St. Louis, Mo.—From paper mache a model has been made of the Stegosaurus, or armored lizard, which scientists claim roamed about the wilds of Wyoming more than 9,000,000 years ago. This prehistoric monster will be exhibited at the World's Fair in the United States government museum.

As restored the animal or reptile, which ever it be, stands 14 feet high and is 20 feet long. It has taken its form partly from the lizard and partly from the turtle. At the center of his back is a large hump supported by a pair of legs about the size of those of an elephant. The front legs are much shorter. On the ridge of the back is a double row of horns like plates. The powerful tail is ten feet long and tapers to a point. Its head is almost two feet long and it has a beak like that of the turtle. The weight of the original is supposed to have been about four tons and the Stegosaurus is believed to have been the largest living being of his time, though by no means the most formidable. His tail appears to have been his only weapon.

Wonder has been expressed at the small size of the animal's head, but scientists claim that half of the animal's brain was located between the thigh bones.


