Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of the State of South Dakota

(RELATING TO INVESTMENTS OF SCHOOL AND OTHER EDUCATIONAL MONIES.)

Section 11. That Section 11 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota be amended so as to read as follows:

11. The monies of any government school and other educational funds shall be invested only in first mortgages upon good improved farm lands within this state as hereinafter provided, or in bonds of school corporations within this state or in bonds of the United States or of the State of South Dakota or of any organized county, township or incorporated city in said state. The legislature shall provide by law the method of determining the amount of said funds, which shall be invested from time to time in such classes of securities respectively, taking care to secure continuous investments as far as possible.

All monies of said funds which may from time to time be designated for investment in farm mortgages and in the bonds of school corporations, or in bonds of organized counties, townships or incorporated cities within this state, shall for this purpose be divided among the county or counties in which the property is located in proportion to population as nearly as practicable by law for such counties or townships or cities. The several counties shall hold and manage the same as trustees, and shall be jointly and severally responsible and accountable for the principal and interest of all such monies until returned because not loaned; and in case of loss of any monies the apportionment of such monies to any county shall make the same good out of its common revenue. Counties shall invest said monies in bonds of school corporations, townships or cities, or in first mortgages upon good improved farm lands, in such limits respectively. The amount of each loan shall not exceed one-third of the actual value of the lands covered by the mortgage, given to secure the same, such value to be determined by the board of county commissioners of the county in which the land is situated and in no case shall more than five thousand dollars be loaned to any one person, firm or corporation and the rate of interest shall not be less than five per cent per annum and shall be such as to exceed one per cent per annum. The higher rate as the legislature may provide shall be payable semi-annually on the first day of January and July; provided, that whenever there are monies of said fund in any county amounting to less than one thousand dollars that cannot be loaned according to the provisions of this section, the same may be returned to the state treasurer to be entrusted to some other county or counties, or otherwise invested under the provisions of this section.

Each county shall semi-annually, on the first day of January and July, render an account of the condition of the funds entrusted to it to the auditor of state, and at the same time pay to or account to the state treasurer the amount of such funds as may be due to it.

The legislature may provide by general law that counties may retain from interest collected in excess of five per cent per annum upon such lands covered by the mortgage, not to exceed one per cent per annum. No county shall be exempted from the provisions of this section by any law or resolution of the state treasurer of interest at the rate provided by law for such counties, and in no case shall the interest so to be paid be less than five per cent per annum.

The legislature shall provide by law for the investment of the monies of school and other educational funds and for the prompt collection of interest and income thereon, and to carry out the objects and provisions of this section.

2. That the foregoing proposed amendments be hereby submitted to a vote of the electors of the state, at the next general election, for their approval.
