PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA.

To the People of the State of South Dakota: The Nineteenth Legislature of the State of South Dakota at the session thereof begun and held at Pierre, the capital of the said State, on the 12th day of January, A. D. 1906, and continued on the third day of March, A. D. 1906, and on the following day, the 4th day of March, A. D. 1906, passed and adopted the following amendments to the constitution of the state, to-wit:

Section 1. That the next general election in this state shall be held on the 1st day of November, A. D. 1906, and that the Legislature of the State of South Dakota, which is hereby agreed to, shall be submitted to the electors of this state for their approval.

Section 2. That the Legislature shall have power to provide for creating such police magistrates for cities and towns as may be deemed from time to time necessary, who shall have jurisdiction of all cases arising under the ordinances of such cities and towns, respectively, and such police
