There is no place where people can sit down, unless it is along the foundation projections of store buildings, and that is only a last resort for men. Bro. Pelton borrowed a chair from somebody the other day and found a nice shady spot under a big tree in the square and there read his letters and papers and laughed with a Peltonian laugh and seemed happy and cool, while the other fellows were standing around in the sun suffering.

Strap iron seats will last for years. Each seat will hold four persons and no vandal knife will mar their beauty.

The Leader, in behalf of hundreds of women and children and old men, respectfully asks the County Commissioners to provide a dozen of those iron seats to begin with. Let us show the women and babies from the country that we are mindful of their comfort while in town, and that court houses and court house lawns will be in evidence long after we of this generation are dead and laid away. What our people need now is all the comfort they can reasonably secure. Future generations can have spring lounges, rocking chairs and electric fans, but we of this generation only ask for a dozen or more iron seats on which one can rest and thank God for the blessings of civilization.

The County Commissioners in thus doing a little to make people comfortable will find their kindness appreciated by a long suffering public.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF SOUTH DAKOTA.

To the People of the State of South Dakota: The Joint Legislature of the State of South Dakota at the session thereof begun and held at Pierre, the capital, on the 13th day of January, A. D. 1906, and concluded on the 13th day of March, A. D. 1906, proposed the following amendments to the constitution of the state, to-wit:

VI. JOINT RESOLUTION proposing and agreeing to an Amendment to Section 23 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of South Dakota, which is hereby submitted to the Vote of the People.

Be it Remembered by the Union of Representatives of the State of South Dakota, the Senate Concurring:

1. That the next general election in this state the following proposed amendment to Section 23 of Article V of the constitution of the State of South Dakota, which is hereby agreed to, shall be submitted to the electors of this state for their approval:

"That Section 23 of Article V of the constitution be amended so as to read as follows: 'Section 23. The Legislature shall have power to provide for creating such police magistrates for cities and towns as may be deemed from time to time necessary, who shall have jurisdiction of all cases arising under the ordinances of such cities and towns, respectively, and such police magistrates may also be constituted ex-officio Justices of the Peace for their respective counties. In cities having a population of five thousand or over, the Legislature may provide, in lieu of police magistrates, for municipal courts, the judges whereof shall be chosen in such manner as the Legislature shall prescribe, which courts shall have exclusive original jurisdiction of all cases, both civil and criminal, cognizable before a Justice of the Peace under the laws of the state, in which the proceeds shall be retained in the city where such court is established; and shall also have exclusive original jurisdiction of all cases arising under the ordinances of such city. Such court shall also have jurisdiction of the same in the county in which such city is situated, in such civil and criminal cases as may be provided by law.'

The above proposed amendment will be voted upon by the people at the general election to be held in this state on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, A. D. 1906.

The proposed amendment will be printed upon the ballot followed by the words: "Shall the above amendment to the constitution in relation to police magistrates and municipal courts be approved and ratified?"

Immediately to the left of which shall be printed the words, "Yes" and "No," each preceded by a square in which the elector can place a cross to indicate his vote. Electors desiring to vote "Yes" will place a cross before the word "Yes," and those desiring to vote "No" will place a cross before the word "No."
