Mr. Charles Dennison Kellogg is best described by the word warbler. Those who have never heard him can form no idea of the charm and beauty of his wonderful gift. His reproduction of the delicate tones of the birds is something which must be heard to be appreciated. Last evening Mr. Kellogg demonstrated his powers of warbling by giving an exhibition. First he whistled a few bars of "Ben Bolt" and gradually increased as he whistled from one tone until, as he finished, he was whistling five distinct tones without arpeggiating. This in itself was wonderful, but when Mr. Kellogg began to warble his whistling fell in the shade. He uses no mechanical device whatever and the tones are produced through the nostrils and not the lips. Last evening during the demonstration Mr. Kellogg sounded a note which was five degrees above a piano, a note of 45,000 vibrations. The register, in fact, covers nine and one-half octaves.
