## Mr. Holter on Elevator Currency.

To the Leader: So far we have only met with one objection to the grain certificate for a currency and this says:

The market value of grain is so fluctuating a more stable security is required. There seems to be some reason in this on the surface but if we examine into the proposition it does not hold good.

The proposition calls for a full government control. The grain passes from the producer into the government elevator. The consumer presents his order for grain to the elevator authorities and receives it and pays for it. The grain gambler has no hand in it. And we know it is the manipulations of the grain gambler that causes the erratic fluctuations in the market value of grain.

Shut the gambler out of the operation and the prices of grain will be far more steady, they will obey the national law of supply and demand. If the demand is great and the supply is comparatively low a given number bushels of grain will represent more dollars. If the supply is large and the demand thereby slackens the same number of bushels will represent fewer dollars, that will be all the difference there is.

The purchasing power of the grain certificate dollar will be even with any other dollar in all other business. We will admit that the market value of grain in the nature of things cannot very well have the same stability as gold, yet the intrinsic value of grain is greater than gold, grain will sustain and recuperate the vital organs of life which gold cannot do. It is not proposed that the grain certificate shall take the place of gold in our money system, gold will continue to be the basis upon which this system rests; the grain certificate will be an auxiliary—an adjunct to meet the increased demand for currency at the crop moving season.

We have a duty to fulfill as citizens. Citizenship is not a mere phrase to play with. There are always wrongs surrounding us to be righted and the property resting in citizenship to right wrong is its most supreme character.

The first wrong to be righted by the measure proposed is the vice of inflicting our circulating currency with undue interest; this is a scheme instituted by greedy money grabbers; and this is a theft that Mr. Bryan inveighed so powerfully against in his lecture in Carnegie Hall, New York, on the subject: "Thou Shalt not Steal."

The second wrong to be righted is the abuses and the confusion that our grain trade now is suffering under as pointed out in a former article.

The third wrong to be righted is the awful abomination of gambling in grain, a vice for which every voter is responsible as fully as the gambler himself.

Says Bryan in the same lecture: "Thou Shalt not Steal."

"Gambling is one of the worst of vices, and gambling in stocks and in farm products is the most destructive form in which the vice appears. Measured by the number of suicides caused by the New York stock exchange, Monte Carlo is an innocent pleasure resort in comparison. Measured by the amount of money changing hands, the contrast is still greater in favor of Monte Carlo, and measured by the influence upon those who do gamble, the evils of Monte Carlo are insignificant when compared with the evils of New York's commercial gambling houses."

How do those that do not gamble suffer retribution for the vice of the gambler, who they permit to carry on the traffic? Let us see: These gamblers commence to bet upon the farmer's crop before he has the seed in the ground and they keep on as the season proceeds, keeping the farmer in a constant boil of anxiety, he is preparing his crop but he does not know what returns his work may bring him, not even when he takes his load to town does he know what may meet him. It happens when he gets there that he finds the bottom dropped out of the market and his product seems to be worth nothing. If he has no debt he may try and console himself with letting time take care of matters. If he has payments to meet at appointed time his hope is frustrated and he finds himself a wreck stranded upon a rock.

Shall we not give a helping response to the powerful pleas of our fearless leaders—President Roosevelt and Mr. Bryan? J. E. HOLTER.
