Starting Alfalfa.

In the matter of laying down a field to alfalfa the Ontario experiment station gives the following suggestions: Select land having a clean, mellow, fertile surface soil overlying a deeply drained subsoil having no acidity. Use large plump seed free from impurities and strong in germinating power. Inoculate the seed with the proper kind of bacteria, providing alfalfa has not been grown successfully on the land in recent years.

As early in the spring as the land is dry enough and warm enough to be worked to good advantage make a suitable seed bed and immediately sow about twenty pounds of alfalfa seed per acre from the grass seed box placed in front of the grain drill and about one bushel of spring wheat or barley per acre from the tubes of the drill. Smooth the land with a light harrow or with a weeder, and if it is very uneven and rather dry also roll it and again sow over it with the harrow or the weeder. As soon as the crop cut the grain and avoid leaving it on the land longer than necessary. Give the alfalfa plants every opportunity to get a good start in the autumn in preparation for the winter.
