The Sioux river is down to a normal stage at this point, but during the high water it cut a new channel across the bend on the Iowa side just south of the Assembly bathing house. Superintendent Gunderson of the Orphan Home made a determined effort to fill up the cut after the first high water but the last rise in the river washed out the obstruction and nearly half of the water coming down goes through the cut. It is likely that the old channel around the bend will gradually fill up and the river will continue to follow its new channel. There are about fifteen acres in the island thus formed which belongs to the Beloit Orphan Home. It is not often the Sioux river changes its channel but the bend was so abrupt that the full force of the current, after turning south at Captain Hanson's boat house, struck the Iowa bank direct and the high water soon dug a canal across. The river was rushing through the new channel Sunday with great force. There will be no more backwater on the south edge of the Assembly ground while the cut-off remains open.

Lying About the Farmers.
One of the instruments being used by the liquor interests in their campaign to extend drunkenness, crime, poverty and misery in Iowa, is a so-called "Traveling Men's Liberty League." The name used illustrates the deceptive methods employed by the liquor interests. The few traveling men who are connected with this so-called "league" are those who travel for breweries and distilleries, makers of saloon fixtures, etc. Under the name of this league large numbers of pamphlets arguing in favor of the liquor interests are being circulated. We have taken the time to read carefully some of these pamphlets, especially one entitled "Prohibition Makes Drug Fiends." In this we find the following:

"In some of the farming districts of Kansas and Iowa, where local sentiment had pronounced so strongly against any traffic in intoxicating liquors that they could only be brought in at the risk of subjecting the importer to prosecution and persecution, it was noticed that drunkenness of a particular violent and insidious-producing kind was largely on the increase among the farm laborers. Ultimately, the explanation was found in the fact that the craving for stimulants, which was denied a more reasonable gratification, had led to the tapping of the vegetable juices of ensilage from the silos in which an alcoholic fermentation was produced in the vegetable masses. These juices contained poisonous qualities capable of causing a peculiarly maddening and destructive form of intoxication."

Was there ever a better illustration of what the love of liquor will do to a man's brain than is furnished in the above? Its utter absurdity and falsity will of course be apparent to the farmer who knows what a silo is, but probably some city folks may be really fooled. We are surprised, however that the man who wrote it did not let his fertile imagination out another notch and explain that cows fed on ensilage give milk cocktails which when fed to women and children produce such unnatural cravings that in many sections entire silos have been torn down and eaten raw.

In all seriousness, if the desire to promote the liquor traffic causes such monstrous lying, is it not time that we stamp out the whole business?
