Hurrah for Hubbard.

Congressman Hubbard of Iowa delivered a speech in the house last week that entitles him to the thanks of every progressive citizen in the nation. He tore Speaker Cannon's brass collar from his neck and stood before the house a free man, demanding the untrammelled privilege of every congressman to discharge his duties and represent his constituents under the right guaranteed by representative government. He declared that with the aid of a few friends appointed by himself, the Speaker is Congress.

Under the present rules of that body, all rights of constituents are assigned to Speaker Cannon, who in many cases fails to notice any congressman who may want to call up some measure that the Speaker in his autocracy may desire to kill or smother in committee.

No legislative body should surren-

der their right to do business in a business way under proper and necessary rules, but when such a body fresh from the people every two years, assign their rights and privileges to the presiding officer, their manhood would be freer from the charge of cowardice if they returned home and let the speaker run the machine with the aid of the rules committee whom he appoints.

The LEADER is pleased at the stand taken by Congressman Hubbard and proud to know that his manhood rebelled against such humiliating conditions.

Seeking favors from the Speaker with fawning hypocrisy and a desire to be on "good terms" with him has made many a good man a coward and a truckler to the disgrace of the men who sent him to congress. A congressman who assigns his rights and privileges to the autocratic whim of a speaker is not worthy of confidence

or a reelection. Every citizen of Iowa and especially of the eleventh district should rejoice in the manly courage of Mr. Hubbard in thus demanding freedom from a servile and humiliating condition that has made the lower house of congress the laughing stock of the masses.

If Congressmen Martin and Burke of this state assign the rights and privileges of their constituents to the tender mercies of an autocrat like Joe Cannon, they will certainly merit retirement to private life at the end of their term.

Corn Contest at Lennox.
