

Typhoid Conquered.

From this time on it is merely a question whether one wishes to be proof against attack by typhoid fever or not. Certainly there can be no reason for contracting the malady unless one chooses.

People nowadays do not "catch" smallpox if they have been properly vaccinated. In case they neglect that customary precaution, it is considered that they have deliberately exposed themselves to the risk of contagion. The same proposition will in the future apply to typhoid, inasmuch as means have been found whereby, through inoculation with a suitable "vaccine" anybody may be rendered permanently immune—that is to say, incapable of acquiring the disease.

The principle of vaccination for smallpox is that of utilizing the germ of a nearly related disease of the cow, much milder in character, to produce immunity against the more serious malady. This idea nowadays is being applied with much success, to other maladies, notably rabies, by Pasteur's discovery, and cholera and bubonic plague, the two latter at the instance of Haffkine, an Englishman. Vaccination for typhoid, first worked out by Sir A. E. Wright of London, is based upon the same theory.

For some time past our own War Department has been busily engaged with the problem of typhoid vaccination, and at the Army Medical Museum, in Washington, large quantities of the immunizing fluid have been manufactured and put up in sealed glass tubes, ready for use—each tube containing the few drops requisite for a dose. For military purposes, it is of the utmost importance to find a means whereby the "putrid fever," which has always been the most deadly enemy of troops—commonly killing more men than were slain by the enemy—shall be robbed of its power to destroy.—From "Typhoid Fever Conquered" Technical World Magazine for May.

State Soldiers Home.

The first meeting of the Soldiers Home board since the death of Col. Dudley, was held at the Home last week and presided over by Col. J. B. Geddes, who has been acting Commandant since February.

There was considerable "unfinished" work for the board to consider owing to the death of Col. Dudley and by Thursday night everything needing attention was disposed of.

There were thirteen candidates for the position of Commandant which did not include the gentleman selected for the responsible and difficult position. Col. Geddes, who had charge of the construction of buildings on the home grounds for some time, and who was placed in command by the board last winter, was deemed the best man for the place and he was elected. His thorough knowledge of the work and his splendid ability as an executive officer made his election an absolute necessity under existing conditions. Few men are qualified to successfully manage a soldiers home. It requires qualities of the highest order and as Col. Geddes is by far the best posted man for the position the board thought they were fortunate in securing his services. Those who were candidates are all good men but have no experience and experience is necessary to a successful administration.

Col. Geddes enlisted as a private in the 126th New York Infantry and came out of the service as Lieutenant Colonel in command of the regiment and his five commissions to show his qualities as a soldier fit to command. He had passed through the war without a scratch until the 31st day of March 1865 when swinging his sabre in leading a charge on Lee's works a rebel bullet plowed through his right hand cutting off the second finger. He has been a resident of Huron for 25 years, has been very successful in business and brings to the home ripe experience and fine business qualification.

A splendid new hospital building has been recently finished and is now occupied by grand old veterans who are on the final march in life's journey. Four of them were members of the home when the writer was in command ten years ago. It is the best appointed hospital in the state and has all modern conveniences for the work required and is presided over by Major Hamilton H. Wilcox, a surgeon of experience and a gentleman who has won the love and respect of the veterans. He is by temperament and experience well fitted for the work and the service required among 280 old veterans brings a surgeon's face to face with conditions not found in a hospital full of civilians. Mrs. Wilcox is a charming lady and is especially well qualified for the duties of the position, having graduated for a trained nurse before marriage. The home hospital is a model institution and the board found it in perfect condition.

The adjutant of the home is Major Henry W. Corl of Salem. He is an accomplished gentleman and a splendid soldier, but his disabilities resulting from army service will compel his retirement from the position before long. He was clerk of courts in McCook county for many years before his appointment by Col. Dudley and he enjoys the confidence of the people of his home county.

Major W. H. Reed is quartermaster and has filled the position for several years being appointed by Col. Goddard. His continuation as quartermaster of the home will depend on the new commandant as he selects his own staff on approval of the board.

The minor officers are all competent men and the oldest in line of continuous service is Captain Allison who was appointed postmaster by the writer 11 years ago.

The home grounds are in good condition and under Col. Geddes' administration will be improved and made more beautiful. Aside from the cottages and new hospital, the grounds are in the same condition as when the writer retired eight years ago.

The South Dakota soldiers home is one of the best in the nation and under the new administration will continue to be a credit to the state and a comfort to those grand old men who in youth marched proudly forth in defense of country and flag.

"Wouldn't It Be Lovely?"

Cedar Rapids Republican: Wouldn't it be lovely if farmers could continue to get 6 cents a pound for their hogs, and \$6.50 per hundred weight for cattle, and the rest of us be able to buy porterhouse steaks and the best brands of ham for 10 cents per pound; if carpenters could get \$3.50 a day and work only five hours, and yet people be able to build houses for what they were able to build them for in 1896, when carpenters worked ten hours a day and got about \$1.50? And wouldn't it be just splendid if the wages of every employe in every manufacturing establishment could be raised from 25 to 50 per cent, without increasing the cost of the things their employers produce to the consumer? And wouldn't it be fine if the railroads could haul people for one cent a mile, and yet pay dividends on their stocks and interest on their bonds and raise their employes' wages all along the line? And wouldn't it be just perfect if the government could carry on all its manifold operations and build battleships, public buildings, harbors, canals, fortifications and everything else without taxing anybody a single penny?

It would, indeed, but unfortunately these things can never come about. There are a considerable number of people, however, who talk and act as though they thought these things were possible. There are people who are in favor of shorter hours for labor and high wages for workmen, of low prices for farmers, low rates of fare on railroads, both freight and passenger, and yet who expects everything they buy, from houses to tooth-picks, to be cheap, and that the railroads shall keep constantly increasing wages, improving their roadbeds and rolling stock, cutting down grades and giving better service all around.

We are all apt now and then to forget Emerson's little aphorism about "each and all." It is altogether possible to bring about an era of low prices; but when we have an era of this kind prices of all sorts of things are low, including the price of labor. When prices are high for one man they are very apt to be high for another. We cannot sell dear and buy cheap. Yet demagogues about every decade or so persuade people that this thing can be done.


