The Town of Le Beau.
A marked copy of the Watertown Public Opinion has been received from our old friend S. X. Way, one of the proprietors of the paper, announcing that the town of Le Beau on the Missouri river has won out in securing the new United States land office. The town is named after Antoine Le Beau, a pioneer Frenchman, who was living there in 1870, when the writer made his first trip up the Missouri river. The steamer Miner, on which we were a guest, tied up at the Le Beau wood yard for the night and blew her loud sounding whistle to let the natives know where they could get flour and bacon and coffee and sugar. The first man aboard was Antoine Le Beau, and he soon found out that I was the editor of the old "Union and Dakotian" at Yankton. "I owe your paper for a long time, about nine year," he said. "I give you twenty dollars" if you call him "square, and we called it square. Then Antoine had other business on hand. The squaw men from far and near had heard the whistle of the boat and were coming fast. In those days a steamboat carried supplies of all kinds for the wood yard men along the river and traded supplies for wood.

About 9 o'clock there must have been thirty "woodhaws" on board and then the game began. They all wanted wet goods as well as dry goods, and by midnight wet goods were in greater demand than dry, judging from appearances. It was a hilarious crowd of frontiersmen, all of them married to or had Indian women for wives and by this martial relation into powerful tribes, they were assured protection against attack or robbery and they could not have lived in that country then under any other condition.

The clerk of the boat was a handy man with the cards and when the games closed at daylight the boat had won enough wood to last her some time, besides selling lots of other stuff. Those wood yard men were great gamblers, and when not trading red liquor with the Indians for robes and ponies, they were cutting wood for steamboats.

That was our first meeting with Antoine Le Beau and his wood yard friends, and we understand that he and a numerous family are yet residents of the town named after him and in which the new land office is to be located largely through the influence and work of Mr. S. X. Way, whose father was one of the northern Iowa pioneers who lived at Ellington, Hancock county, when we first knew him. He was a splendid man and a warm friend of the writer.
