Vessey is the Man
 Governor Vessey should be supported for a second term by every well meaning loyal citizen of the state. His opponents are not worthy of the honor. Elrod, when governor, was the willing tool of the bosses and corporations, and Geo. W. Egan has no claim upon the office. His ambition is personal with a desire to seek revenge.

Governor Vessey is not a brilliant campaigner or a shouter for glory, but he has given the people an honest, clean administration, and not a single charge against him for neglect of duty or failure to protect the interests of the people.
 The standpat hool of extravagance in appropriations is mere campaign rot. It is true appropriations for the care of state institutions were heavy, but he did not make them. The members in both branches of the legislature heard all the evidence in support of what the institutions needed for proper care and efficient work, and after a full discussion decided that the appropriations asked for were needed, and were voted almost unanimously. The Governor signed the bills.

The other side of the picture is different. South Dakota has many public institutions, too many, perhaps, for the population, but what are you going to do with them? There are only two propositions to be considered in this connection. One is to close up some of the institutions and the other is to support them to the limit of efficiency. What side will you take?
 Every liberty loving citizen would do as Gov. Vessey and the legislature did, because modern conditions demand liberal support for anything that is good. The insane must be provided for, and the great schools of learning must be supported, and the helpless and infirm must be taken care of, and these institutions must be provided for no matter who is governor.

Gov. Vessey stands for decency and good government, and every citizen who believes this is the proper spirit for a progressive, christian people, should support him at the primary.
 If Gov. Vessey is wrong then modern civilization is wrong. You cannot change this view of the condition that demands proper care and support of state institutions.
 Gov. Vessey is a safe, careful, business man, and his only ambition is to give the state the best administration possible, and the LEADER hopes and believes his vote will be greater in Lincoln county this year than two years ago when it gave him a greater majority than any other county in the state.
 Let old Lincoln maintain her reputation for patriotism and progress. Vote for Thomson, Schrader, Vessey and the entire progressive state ticket.

One of the standpat howls is about increased assessments and higher taxes. We suppose these howlers would like to see the price of farm lands fall back to old figures and bank accounts dwindle to nothing. Land worth \$50 and \$60 an acre when land was governor is now worth \$80, and \$75, and the howlers howl because of this evidence of prosperity, which calls for higher taxes on \$50 land than on \$75 land.

Judging by the standpat howl about higher taxes and higher valuations on farm land, they want to go back to mortgage prisons, mortgages and low taxes. They seem to want Cleveland made conditions when people burned their feet. A standpat is hard to please.

The intention of Thomson and Schrader in the June primary is of more importance than a mere victory over the opposition. Their success would mean that the people want a square deal in government and are opposed to the standpat. It is the intention of the standpat to enrich the few and rob the masses.
 The people of South Dakota desire a square deal in congress and in the state. They want to destroy the rule of the standpat, they must have a government that will care for the people, and not those who have no conscience. Martin and Burke are the standpat, and they support the standpat, while Thomson and Schrader are the progressive party and support the progressive party for justice and a square deal.

Senator Dolliver said in his great speech at Des Moines: "The time has come for the American people to resume business in their own name." A glorious sentiment.

No sincere republican believes the party can long endure under the leadership of Aldrich and Cannon.

The immense slush fund expended two years ago by the interests to keep their man in the senate, failed because the people could not be purchased.

The standpat Huron convention is where Martin and Burke gave it to Kit in the wind, because Kit forced them from cover and made them expose their weakness to the people. Kit has no love for them and they have no sugar in their pockets for Kitty.

Thousands of good republicans who followed the fortunes of Martin and Burke two years ago, will vote the progressive ticket this year. Cannonism had not been exposed then. At that time it was a question of fact, now it is a question of protection against a robber tariff.

Hon. W. E. Benedict of Belle Fourche, candidate for state railroad commissioner on the progressive republican ticket, was in Canton Saturday, and reports the people progressive in spirit all over the state. Mr. Benedict came to Lincoln county with his parents in 1872, and lived on a farm in Dayton township for 20 years. He has been a resident of the Black Hills since leaving Canton. He should receive a heavy vote in this his old home county, besides he is thoroughly qualified for the work, and a vote cast for him at the June primary is a vote for a man who will give the people a square deal. Remember Benedict on June 7.

Every republican who loves his party for the great and glorious work accomplished from Lincoln to Roosevelt, knows from the hand writing on the political wall in Massachusetts and New York, that if the Cannon-Aldrich tariff robbers are able to fool the people into even a narrow victory this year, it means the defeat of the party in 1912. The success of progressive republican principles can alone save the party and reinvest it with the spirit and pride of former days when it represented equal rights for all and special privileges to none. A vote for any man who represents Cannonism and all it stands for is a vote cast for the destruction of the party, for the party cannot live as a Cannon-Aldrich party.

A Comparison.
 Sioux Falls Press:—On June 7 at the primaries, will be answered the question as to whether Congressmen Martin and Burke will be returned, or whether John F. Schrader of Rapid City and Thomas Thorsen of Canton, will be sent to congress as the choice of the people of South Dakota. The Press believes that the people will be emphatically in favor of the progressive candidates. Both Martin and Burke are stalwarts, unmistakably aligned with the Aldrich-Cannon class of statesmen. In the face of the almost universal denunciation of the Aldrich-Cannon methods, by the citizens everywhere, east, west, north and south, these two South Dakota congressmen either apologize for their attitude toward these men or decline to come right out and say where they stand. Their tardy endorsement of Roosevelt policies is evidently forced from them by the stress of public opinion. The people know this and South Dakota has already expressed herself on the question of whether a corporation shall rule in the state or whether the people shall rule through loyal and honest representatives.

John F. Schrader, of Rapid City, is for progressive principles that are being realized in this state through the progressive wing of the republican party.

Thomas Thorsen of Canton, is a man against whom no one can speak ill, either in private or public life. He is a Roosevelt man and a loyal supporter of Governor Vessey, than whom South Dakota never had a more honest, fearless or loyal governor. The fact that Martin and Burke are today, seeking to place in the governor's chair, a man of the servile record of former Governor Elrod, is sufficient to condemn them. What has Governor Vessey done and what has his administration done that has not been in the interests of the people of South Dakota? There has not been even a whisper that Vessey or others of his administration are controlled or led around and dictated by any corporation interest.

Thousands of republicans who voted the standpat ticket two years ago will vote for Thomson and Schrader and Vessey next month. Such men were sincere in their belief that Martin and Burke would represent them as well as the progressives, but their support of the robber tariff bill and their support of Cannon convinced the people of this state that Martin and Burke had betrayed them and were no longer fit to represent the state. Kiltredge, the railroad boss, is down and out, and Martin and Burke stood by the trusts and against the people, hence there is no longer any possibility for division among the republicans of the state and it is safe to assume that the progressive ticket will receive three quarters of the vote this year that was against it two years ago.
