The Secretary of the Interior has ordered the auction sale of five townships in the Cheyenne River and Standing Rock Indian reservation.

The lots in the Townsite of Timber Lake will be sold at Timber Lake on August 15th, and those in Dupree will be sold at Aberdeen on August 22nd. Both these towns are on the Milwaukee railroad. The other three townships will be sold at Lemmon, South Dakota, beginning August 29. The purchase price is to be paid in three annual installments, and any person may buy as many lots as he chooses. The first 8000 persons to whom numbers were assigned at the registration last fall have been given opportunity to make entry, and about 1,500,000 acres remain for entry by persons holding the higher numbers, who will begin their filings on September 1. All the lands which are not entered by the persons holding numbers will be subject to entry on and after November 1, 1910, by any person who is qualified to make a homestead entry. JAS. W.
