SCIENCE

Dr. de Quervain's Trans-Greenland Expedition is now under way, the party having sailed from Copenhagen for the west coast of Greenland the end of April.

Tenth International Geographic Congress.—This much postponed meeting is, according to the latest announcement, to be held in Rome in the week beginning March 27, 1913.

A Dry Month in England.—During April, 1912, the total rainfall registered at Greenwich observatory was only 0.02 inch. This is the driest month recorded at that observatory, at any period of the year, for 100 years.

Dr. S. Rona, late vice-director of the Meteorological and Magnetic Institute of Hungary (the national weather service of the country), has been appointed director of that institution.

Explorations in Iceland.—A remarkable series of explorations was carried out in Iceland during the years 1910 and 1911 by a Swiss traveler, Herm. Stoll, who covered a distance of over 5,000 kilometers (upward of 3,100 miles) in the course of the two years.

Finger Prints in Banks.—German banks, according to newspaper dispatches, have begun to introduce the finger print as a mark of identification on checks. The method is already in use in the United States.

Climatic Statistics of the British Isles.—A joint committee comprising two representatives of the Meteorological Office and two of the Royal Meteorological Society is planning the publication by these two organizations of a collection of climatic normals for the British Isles. Barometric pressure and wind direction will be first dealt with.

Designs for the Australian Capital.—According to press despatches the first prize in the competition for designs for the new seat of government of Australia, viz., £1,750 (\$8,516), has been awarded to Walter Burley Griffin of Chicago; the second to Elie Saarinen of Helsingfors, Finland; and the third to Alfred Agache of Paris. As decided three years ago, after long discussion, the new capital is to be built in the Yass-Canberra district of New South Wales.

Another Attempt to Scale Mt. McKinley.—The Bulletin of the American Geographical Society reports that the expedition to Mt. McKinley which left Fairbanks, Alaska, on February 5th, fitted out by a newspaper of that town to attempt the ascent of the mountain, returned unsuccessful on April 10th. An elevation of 10,000 feet was reached on the north side of the mountain east of Peter Glacier, where precipitous ice cliffs prevented further progress.

The Harbor of Colombo.—In 1875 the late King Edward VII, then Prince of Wales, laid the first block of the southwest breakwater of the harbor of Colombo, Ceylon. Prior to that time the harbor had been an open roadstead exposed to the full violence of the monsoons. On May 1st of the present year the Governor of Ceylon, Sir Henry McCallum, laid the final stone in an extension of the southwest breakwater, thus completing the construction of one of the finest artificial harbors in the world, which is a square mile in area and capable of accommodating 40 to 50 vessels of over 12,000 tons. The total cost of construction has amounted to about \$15,000,000.

Banana Flour.—Banana flour specially prepared as a tonic food is making its appearance in Paris under the name of Bananeine. It is to be marketed within a recent period this fruit was little used in France, and even now its consumption is limited. However, measures are being taken to increase the importation, and it is said that 70 vessels were recently fitted up for bringing the fruit to Europe.

Banana Flour has a much more extended use in England than on the continent, but efforts are now made to introduce it in France owing to its great nutritious value. The bananeine is a preparation made for convenient use, and it contains 90 per cent of banana flour, this being put through a sterilizing process at the proper heat.

A Rubber Substitute from Sea Fish. A press statement forwarded by Consul Frank W. Mahlin of Amsterdam, tells of a factory established at Ymuiden at the mouth of the North Sea Canal in Holland to produce a substitute for rubber, and it is reported that the company operating the factory has succeeded in producing a substance having the qualities of rubber and some special advantages over the genuine. While the process is a secret the principal ingredient is said to be fresh sea fish, which are brought to Ymuiden in vast quantities by the Dutch fishing fleets. According to report 15 to 16 per cent of natural rubber is added to the fish, and the result is a substance as flexible and elastic as rubber, but much cheaper—about as 1.25 to 8 in price, compared with real rubber. The low price of this product will be caused partly by the by-products

which are possible, for it is said that much albumen will be made from the fish and that half of the factory is arranged for the manufacture of fertilizer.

The James River Base.

Fifty years ago this time McClellan was ensconced on the James River at Harrison's Landing, whence he had retreated from his victory at Malvern Hill.

Harrison's Landing was a good base. McClellan wished to stay there. As long as he stayed, he made the Army of Lee immobile. The moment McClellan's Army was withdrawn, Lee attained freedom again to carry the war far north from Richmond, even to the gates of Washington.

The James was the true base for an attack on Richmond, as Grant was to be taught by the Wilderness, Spotsylvania and Cold Harbor. It was a strategic error of the first magnitude, of which the Washington Government was guilty, when Halleck ordered McClellan to return to the Potomac. To keep the war in Southern territory, to keep the Confederate Capital in peril, to tie the Southern Armies down to Richmond, required an attack from Chesapeake Bay up the James River.

To withdraw the Army from the James to the Potomac was to transfer the war to the latter at a stroke, and, as the event proved, to open the way to an invasion of the North.

On the other hand, although McClellan's strategy was sound enough, he was not the commander to execute his own strategy, and the letter he wrote President Lincoln from Harrison's Landing should have earned his own recall, although not that of his Army.

General John Pope had been brought from the West to command the united forces which had been operating against Jackson. It was proposed to reinforce this Army both from Washington and from McClellan's returning forces, and to attack by the land route on the upper Rappahannock.

General Pope was brought East against his own will. He had a good reputation and expectations for him were high. He had opened the Mississippi above Memphis by employing exactly the same strategy that Grant afterward was to employ against Vicksburg.

One wonders what would have been the upshot had Halleck pitched upon Grant instead of Pope to bring East to command the overland attack. But Halleck didn't like Grant, and Grant at this time was still under the shadow of Shiloh, although Shiloh had demonstrated that Grant at least was a fighter.

Spiced Fruits.

For spiced peaches, either scald them just enough for the skins to slip off, or peel them so carefully that the marks of the knife will not show. Clingstones are to be chosen if the fruit is to be left whole; free stones may be used by halving and pitting after peeling. When ready for use, weigh the fruit and allow five pounds of sugar and a pint of vinegar to eight pounds of fruit, mix an ounce of stick cinnamon, mace and green ginger, and tie in cheese-cloth, stick three whole cloves in each peach. Make the syrup of sugar and vinegar and spices, skimming; then add the fruit and simmer until tender, then lift carefully and put into jars, shaking to settle, and let the syrup boil down until quite thick; add a few cracked peach kernels to each jar and pour the boiling hot syrup over the fruit and seal up tightly.

Cherries may be put up with the same proportions, but the weighing must be done before they are pitted; they are better made more like a marmalade.

Small pears make a nice spiced pickle; stems must be left on and the peel merely wiped; the blossom end should be cut out with a sharp knife. Allow the above amount of sugar and vinegar to nine pounds of prepared fruit. Make the syrup, skim, and put into jars, boil down the syrup, and pour over the fruit, boiling hot and seal.

Apples, green (or nearly ripe) grapes, melons, and anything used for making sweet pickles, may be put up in this way. The fruit must be as fresh as possible, free from damage, and where not cored, must be perfect inside. The best of spices and vinegar must be used, and the jar, top and rubber all sterilized; the rubbers must be new. Unless proper care is taken the labor may be wasted, through fruit spoiling.
