A Good Word For the Dog.

Perhaps he is right. Doubtless there is much to be said against the wandering, free-and-easy, piratical, germ-collecting and garbage-can-overturning dog of the cities. But, on the other hand, there are things in favor of the dog. Dozens of poor women who go out to labor at the tub or on the office floors leave their small children in care of a dog. A dog stands guard over many a pitiful home. Often he is the only pet and plaything the children have. They learn love from his faithfulness.

Sometimes a dog bites a child, but the dog's side of the story is never told. Usually there is thoughtless or premeditated cruelty as cause for the bite. The dog naturally defends himself.

A story that went the rounds of the papers last week told of the attempt of a chained dog to save his little master from drowning, and how the dog, finally breaking the chain too late, brought the lad's clothing to the house and warned the family of the trouble.

The rich have their cars, their horses, their kennels and their sports. The poor man should have his dog. The dog tax ought not to be prohibitive. It should rather be low. To muzzle a dog is cruelty and should be practiced only at those times when infection is abroad and the dog is dangerous. And even then he is not as dangerous as he is written down to be.

All over this land dogs are guarding henneries, barns and sheep and cattle. They are watching over children and caring for their rights. The dog typifies faithfulness. He is one of God's best gifts to man.—Minneapolis Journal.

Modern Table Ways.

Avoid "jumping up" from the table. Any man feels self-conscious when the hostess is forced to run many errands, and yet he is so awkward when he tries. A systematic method of setting the table will avoid it all.

Avoid letting mother do too much serving. This sometimes takes too much time and the family dispenses with all show of order and system.

And let one of the children pour the water in the glasses just before the family is seated. One of the children could wait on mother's left to carry the coffee or tea cups as she fills them. This will avoid many embarrassing "spills." While this is being done, if the meal has been in progress the child's plate should be served by the one sitting to the left. Never touch a coffee, tea or cocoa cup while in the hands of the one serving. Let her place it firmly on the table.

If possible use simple bread and butter plates and never crumble the bread up on the table cloth. Allow one person to do all the waiting upon the table during the entire meal. Nothing looks worse than to see two or more people absent from the table at once.

As soon as the vegetable and meat course is removed brush the crumbs with scraper, brush or a napkin and always into a tray or plate, never into the hand.

Do not serve dessert until all plates are removed. Give the girl a chance to brighten the home and there is no better place to begin than at the family dining table.

"The spirit of progress has entered every part of the known world and has found its way into the most remote corners of our homes. The girl whether from town or country, who finds herself unacquainted in a small measure with the line of progress is like the raw recruit in the ranks of war who knows not the call of the bugle.

Changes are on every hand and the happy woman or girl is the one who adds her own personality to the new order of things and makes it seem "her system." Instead of a system of law and order by which she is controlled.

A change has come about in every line of housework. Beds are made vastly different from the manner of fifty years ago. Dishes demand different treatment, cooking utensils claim their share of new treatment, the carpet sweeper and vacuum cleaners have come to stay, and thousands of other changes mark the progress of the house.

Perhaps nowhere is the change more evident than upon the family table. The amount of food placed upon the table is perhaps no greater, but the varieties of ways the food is prepared fail to bring the same dull monotony. The reckless, crowded easy method of serving the family dinner has gone, and today the cry comes for three things:

3. Simplicity of service.

The well-ordered table bears no skeletons of departed viands, when the supply is exhausted. A plain side table or dinner wagon stands near to receive them, and the table presents a pleasing appearance, without reminding the hostess that the potatoes have "run out." A plea for a simply served, well ordered meal is made to all our readers in "The House Without a Maid."

The family can afford to wait while the mother or daughter "freshens up a bit" before the dinner is served. An untidy hostess makes an untidy family.


