Notice to Voters.

Under the new primary election law the members of all political parties must be enrolled as members of their party before they have the right to vote at the primary elections. The members of any party may enroll themselves in any party any time up to and including the 31st day of October next, for the succeeding primary election, and failing to so enroll, may enroll themselves at the office of the County Auditor after the 31st day of October, up to the first day of January; but in order to accommo-

date the electors of the City of Canton, should any such wish to enroll themselves as members of their party, I will be at the City Hall in the Commissioners' room upstairs with the enrollment books all day on Thursday, the 11th day of September, 1913, from 9 o'clock in the morning until 5 in the evening to enroll such as wish to be enrolled.
