Program for Memorial Day.

The local G. A. R. and W. R. Farm Names.

Much inquiry is made in regard to what is necessary to do in making farms. Provision is made by Chapter 133, Session laws 1911 of South Dakota, as follows:
The owner of any farm or ranch in the state of South Dakota, may, on payment of one dollar to the clerk of the circuit court in the county in which the farm or ranch may be situated, have the name of such farm or ranch entered and recorded in a register which the clerk of the courts shall keep for that purpose, and thereupon such owner shall be by said clerk furnished a certificate, issued under the seal of said official, setting forth therein the name and location of the farm or ranch and the name of such owner provided, that when any name shall have been provided any other person or persons shall not have the right to use the same name for any other farm or ranch in the same county except by prefixing or adding thereto designation or other identifying words.
