

SPECIAL GRAND DISPLAY TWENTIETH CENTURY FIREWORKS AT SOUTH DAKOTA STATE FAIR

Every Night of Week September 14 to 18

Every Pyrotechnic Device Known will be Displayed—Thousands of Dollars Worth of Bombs, Mortars, Aerial Pieces, Set Pieces, Ball Game in Fireworks, Etc.

In addition to the fireworks to be displayed in connection with "The Opening of Panama" at the South Dakota State Fair, the Pain Fireworks Company will give a two hour exhibition of Twentieth Century Pyrotechnics, something far grander and far more magnificent and awe inspiring than anything ever before attempted in the amusement line. The display at last year's fair was so wonderful, that many visitors who saw it on the opening nights wired their friends at home to come on the next train. (4) "The Panama" Aerial Rainbow, arranged by the discharge of (25) 4-6-8 pound rockets, fired rapidly in succession from two positions, the effect being each climbing higher and higher, discharging beautiful stars of various effects.

(7) Display of Twentieth Cen-

ture Flery Aeroplanes, a French novelty, great umbrellas of fire, ascending and descending reaching a height of forty to fifty feet.

(39) Alfalfa fields. This is one of the most expensive designs in pyrotechnics, and produced exclusively by us, by the salute of 12 inch double shot alfalfa bombs, covering an area of several thousand feet, beautiful and lasting emerald hues.

(41) The Miser's Dream. After reaching a great height they burst forth into magnificent cascades that represent falling golden nuggets.

(43) Roar of the Milky Way. Is produced from a description of Kipling by the simultaneous discharge of four cannons and four twinkling star bombs, flickering through the clouds.

(44) Special firing of (12) 8 pound Pain's Cleopatra's Necklaces Rockets. Immense hanging chains of jewels floating through the clouds, colors of sapphire, turquoise, emerald, ruby, topaz, opal, etc., representing mammoth necklaces, one of the most wonderful and beautiful effects of the fireworks art.

(45) Aerial Searchlight—An immense shell fired from a 50 inch steel gun, which opens at a great height, lighting the surrounding country for miles as bright as day.

(54) "Noah's Ark and the Animals. Noah at the door of the Ark releasing the animals, first the lions, then the tigers, elephants, giraffes, camels, monkeys, bears, etc. Amusing and instructive.

(55) The Indian and the Owl. First firing shows large owl perched on limb of tree, blinking. Next firing shows life-sized Indian with bow and arrow—Indian fire, arrow strikes owl, knocking him from tree. Very amusing and interesting.

(59) Aerial Blizzard. Permitted by the discharge of salvoes of six shells, filling the air with scudding flashes of silver fire, passing in every direction.

(62) State Fair "Bouquet," consisting of a light of two-hundred rockets, made especially for this occasion, fired simultaneously from two positions, one of the most beautiful effects imaginable and a fitting close to the beautiful display.

(63) Grand Finale—"Good Night," "Panama Dreams."
